# CYMBIDIUM NOTES - AUGUST

Although the particularly cold weather has this year inhibited the early opening of the buds, they are becoming more pleasing now as spikes show off their beauty.

As mentioned previously many plants although in spike have not lived up to expectation as regards the number of blooms initiated. showing as few as 2, 3 & 4 blooms, which is disappointing especially when previous years have shown what the plant is capable of bearing. There is little a grower can do in these circumstances except to continue the enjoyment of the little we have and hope for better things next season. I'm sure that orchid movers will maintain their usual good car to all their plants despite the disappointments. Once again some excellent plants were benched at the S.C.O.C. winter show, and all those intending to exhibit plants at the important and popular Spring Show will need to do their final cultural necessities in the weeks left before early October.

We trust newer exhibitors took careful notice of the way plants were prepared and benched recently as the very important feature of all shows is attention given to every plant exhibited. So much attention has still to be given to the pests which, despite all our care, still manage to elude the baits and sprays etc. that we place to trap them. A regular feature in my culture has been a nightly inspection of plants with spikes, after dark, by the use of a strong hand held light, much to the detriment of small slugs. snails, caterpillars It is revealing to a grower to see just how many of these and grubs. pests invade the spikes during the hours of darkness. The tiny snails and slugs don't always seen attracted to the baits laid but unerringly slide up the spikes and feast on the buds unless caught. Remember that such attacks can ruin your chance of a championship, or prize at the club shows. Don't add to your disappointments and frustrations, when a little extra care can prevent this.

Continue your spike and flower care even if you do not enter your plants for judging. A spike bent and twisted at odd angles and flowers facing in all directions looks no better in your own home than it would on the show bench, so training culture is quite important and becomes a matter of personal pride. Half strength fertilizer still applies for August, if indeed our culture allows for any fertilisation at all during the wet and colder months of the year, when growth slows down drastically. Another job that can be fitted in is to check your stock of compost and pots, labels, marking pencil or pen, dusting sulphur, etc., in readiness for the dividing or potting on that will follow immediately after flowering has finished. It is much easier to keep one jump ahead if possible.

Finally don't forget to clean up the pot before showing any orchid plant. Pots are seen on some benches in a somewhat dirty condition, especially noticeable are the white 'salty' deposits around the drain holes on the sides of the containers. These can be removed with steel wool, scotch-Brite, or similar rough material and a little elbow Every care counts on showbench preparation.

# DENDROBIUM 'SPECIOSUM" Hybridising - Where to? edited extract from A.O.R. Sept. 1981 by Ronald Kerr

Dendrobium speciosum has been used little in hybradising. The few who have used it as a parent have invariably kept to the crossing within its own Dendrocoryne section, and with some success.

A dramatic breakthrough has now come with the crossings made to Ceratobium dendrobiums.

The habitat range of D.'speciosum' extends from Eastern Victoria to Cape York, plus evidence of one plant even beyond to New Guinea. The type form of D. 'speciosum. var. 'speciosum' has only rarely been found North of the Hunter Valley.

Pseudobulbs are generally short and thick, flowers large with 20 - 40 on a stem. Colour can be white or cream with purple spotting and yellow is not uncommon. the variety D.'hillii' extends from the Hunter Valley to the ranges of South-Eastern Queensland. It is very floriferous and may carry 100 flowers on a stem. Flowers are smaller and in general not as open as those on type form. Around Kenilworth, west of Brisbane D. 'hillii' is replaced by D. ;speciosum', 'grandiflorum', which is known for its large flowers, floriferousness and consistently good yellow colour. Queenslanders often refer to both D. 'hillii' and 'grandiflorum' as the 'King Orchid".

The habitat range of D. 'speciosum' is extended northwards from MacKay to near Cooktown by its variety 'curvicaule'. This variety is characterised by short broad sepals an stems with fewer flowers, more like variety 'speciosum'. It tends to have more cream to yellow flowered clones at its southern limit.

Amazingly the varieties are quite clear cut within their habitat ranges and there is little evidence of intermediate forms. It would be interesting to ascertain whether each variety has a different pollinator, or whether the difference is entirely due to geographical barriers.

From this look at the various varieties of Dendrobium 'speciosum' it appears that the best forms of the varieties 'speciosum' and 'grandiflorum' would be the logical ones to use in a breeding programme, but here nature springs a surprise; the two outstanding natural hybrids are found in the area in which variety 'hillii' dominates. The first of these is a cross with the small yellow flowered D. 'gracilcaule'. The cross is distributed throughout the var. 'hillii' habitat. Rupp named this natural hybrid Dendrobium 'gracillimum' in 1945. At the time he did not realise it was a hybrid. Now Stephen Clemesha has found this name to be illegitimate under the rules of nomenclature. He has combined the names of both parents to suggest a new name D. X'gracilosum' which is still subject to review.

The other natural hybrid is with D. 'Kingianum' to create D x 'delicatum'. It is also widely distributed and quite variable. It is evident that var. 'hillii' should be a consideration in a breeding programme. It can impart immense floriferousness and hardiness to its progeny. Flower size is reduced, and flowers may not be as open nor segments as broad as desirable. However in a long range programme it could be used in its rarer yellow forms. Several southern hybridisers have used good forms of var 'speciosum' for crossing within the Dendrocoryne section. There are some magnificent flowering forms in this group. Clones with compact pseudobulbs, strong stems, tough-textured open flowers with wide segments and fresh glistening whites, creams or yellows available in many collections.
