***Cattleya amethystoglossa***  
**Amethyst-lipped Cattleya**

Full-grown specimens may produce as many as 30 flowers, though 6-8 is common. Plants of this species require greater warmth and light than most other Cattleyas-similar to *C. aclandiae*.

The species, like *C. aclandiae* comes from coastal Bahia and Espirito Santo in Brazil. It grows on rock outcrops and on palms in full sunny exposures, enjoying warmth and humid air.

## WINTER SHOW – HUB SHOPPING CENTER – JULY 2001

Due to a couple of decisions made by the shopping centre management the Club's Winter Show was nothing like the successful shows we have had over the past couple of years.

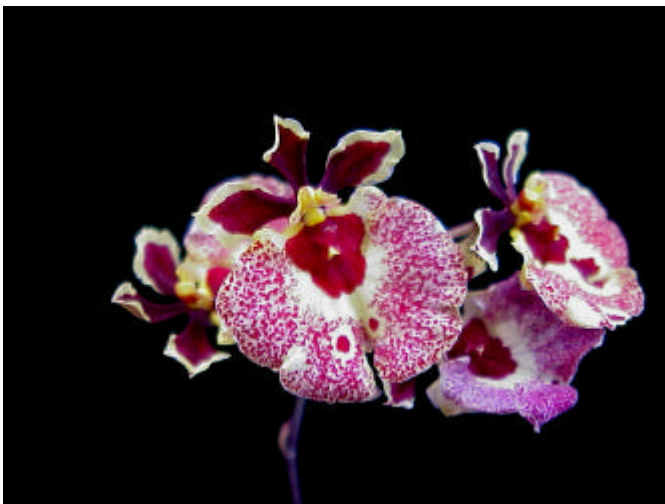
Due to a double booking of the allocated show area the club was told we had to have our take out on Wednesday afternoon instead of Saturday. This was a set back but one we could overcome with a little co operation by the members. To the members credit they rallied and bought along an excellent number of both show and trading table plants.

It was nearing the completion of judging that centre management's rep. arrived and informed us that the total area allocated to the club for both display and trading table was in the order of 4 square metres. A meeting of committee members present and the show marshals decided that it was more beneficial to the club to have a small display without a trading table .

Thanks must go to Leslie and her team of willing helpers who managed to build such a great display. Considering the number of show plants that were taken home on the day and the size restrictions imposed the display was a credit to all involved.

I believe that judging was completed without too many worries. Second division was moved for judging purposes due to power for lights being turned off in one area due to centre maintenance. No problems have been reported by the Registrar of Judges.

Last but certainly not least a big thank you to all members who participated in the show in any way. The amount of co operation and understanding shown by members when told of the reduced display and no trading table was a credit to them all. I know it is not pleasant when people have bought along show and trading table plants, fencing, ferns and other display and trading table equipment in good faith only to be told to take them home again. Special thanks must go also to those people who loaded up the plants of members who had gone home. In summary the show was not the total disaster it could have been but we must make sure that it does not happen again.

From The Registrar

There was quite an increase in the number of plants displayed in August and a wide variety as well. Cymbidiums are coming to their peak and we are seeing more Australian Natives on the bench. I'm still settling into our new venue and with the trial of the new computer system combined with an award judging, I overlooked documenting the divisional winners at the meeting, hence the rather thin descriptions which are from memory only. I wish to apologize to the owners for this oversight as they were all worthy winners and the decision for flower of the night was very close.

I am hoping that the judges will be able to provide more cultural information in our plant commentaries at the monthly cultural meetings. As Richard Fishlock pointed out in his commentary, we need to pay more attention to the presentation of our plants. This does become very important to the judges, especially when we have a situation where 2 plants are equal in quality and it becomes necessary to consider presentation to select the eventual winner.

Plant labeling is an important aspect of our hobby. As orchid growers we are lucky to have a system of registration which is the envy of many other genus societies (e.g. Roses, ferns, Begonias). We have a system of registration which allows us to trace the parentage in the great majority of our hybrids back to the originating species. We should therefore pay close attention to the correct labeling of our plants.

Rarely do I find when I go through the results that I can find all plants in the list of registrations. There is always at least one which I cannot find and several others where names have been misspelled or the intergeneric name is confused (e.g. Slc. when it should be Lc.). It is very easy to make spelling mistakes when copying from the label in the pot to the show label (and even I'm not immune to making mistakes as you may have noticed). This month, for example, the ones I can't track down are Cym. Majika and Cym. Magica; at the Winter show it was Paph. Babourne (since resolved as Paph. Barbourne). The fault is not always with the Club member at the end of the chain, however, as there are many well documented cases of incorrect labeling of plants by hybridists and incorrect plants being cloned.

I always try to ensure that what appears in the gazette is correct so it is up to you to make corrections to your labels. From this month on, I will highlight any correction that I have found for plants that win in any competition. Any crossings which I find that have been registered are also indicated. I nearly always have a computer at the meetings and shows so please ask if you would like to have your seedling checked for registration.
