This meeting is informal and is aimed at people who are interested in becoming South Coast Judges or recording for Judges at Shows or Meetings. We badly need to build up a pool of our own Judges and to this end we need YOUR support. For both the Shows at the Marion Recreation Centre we are limited in the amount of time we have to complete the judging, so a large number of judges is essential. Can you help, please?

DAYTIME CHAPTER R. &. B. CLARK

Keith Northcote opened the meeting with a welcome to all and a special welcome to Jill Taylor and other visitors. It was noted that some of our 'regulars' were absent and it is hoped those feeling off color are now quite recovered.

Jill, from the Orchid Club of South Australia, is an A.O.C. Judge and spoke on her favoured topic Cattleyas and Allied genera. Cattleyas, Brassavolas, Laelias and Sophronitis, all have similar backgrounds and their origins are in Central America from Mexico to the middle South America where they grow as epiphytes on trees in dappled light with plenty of air movement and humidity. They will grow in therefore, on or bark. Epiphytes need nitrogen fertilizers e.g. fish emulsion used half strength and leaves should be also sprayed, particularly on the underside. Water in the morning to allow drying out throughout the day the mix should not be soggy nor bone dry. Water everyday in summer, including the ground below, to provide humidity, and once a week in winter.

Repotting is done either when flowering is finished or when new roots appear. Start at the edge of the pot to allow forward growth and don't overpot - allow for two or three new growths. Jill says that growing Cattleyas cold usually means less disease and fewer bugs.

Of particular interest were the slides Jill showed of her intriguing glasshouse, growing conditions, and of numerous beautiful blooms. All this was much appreciated by those present.

Jill was invited to select her choice of the benched orchids all

of which were of the Cattleya Alliance. She took opportunity illustrate to features of the blooms which would appeal to orchid judges and finally selected H.& B. Viney's C. Portiata with K. Northcote's Blc. Greenwald 'Eucla' second and third H.& B. Viney's C. Chocolate Drop 'Kodama X Blc. Sylvia Fry. (Please note this plant is registered as Blc. Adelaide Silver, Ed.)

This, however, caused some amusement as the members choices were 1st. Lc. Mary Elizabeth Bohn, 2nd tie between Blc. Malworth and Epicat. Nebo all grown by Keith Northcote. Looks like the members wouldn't rate too highly as judges! We particularly missed Helen and her orchids.

The raffle plants were supplied by Adelaide Orchids, thank you. The meeting closed and was followed by the usual cuppa.

HYGIENIC HOUSEKEEPING by Darcy Bloomfield

Pots and containers should be cleaned and disinfected (0.5 - 1% Sodium Hypochlorite) before use and stored off the ground.

All potting material should be treated with Fongarid, back cuts dipped in 0.5% Sodium Hypochlorite and then in water and Sulphur powder put on the cut ends.

All tools and equipment should be sterilized either in bleach, methylated spirits or flamed.

All propagation and grooming benches disinfected weekly if possible.

Glasshouse floors cleaned of plant residue and leaf litter. Hose nozzles should be kept off the ground.

Any plant suspected of dying or in difficulties should be separated and treated away from the growing area.

Old inflorescences, dead leaves and discolored leaves should be cut off the plant as soon as possible.

Fungal and sunburnt parts of leaves should be cut off.

GENERAL NOTES

Environmental conditions that contribute to the health of the plant are:

the right amount of light

Temperature within the proper Day - Night range

Humidity coupled with good
air circulation

Water to suit the needs of the plant

Proper **nutrition** combined with root aeration.

Diseases are caused by invading Viruses, Bacteria, or Fungi. Also prevention of insect injury is an absolute necessity.

Light - When the light is too strong chlorophyll is destroyed faster than it is made, and leaves become yellow, or even white in young seedlings.

Temperature - each kind of orchid has its own temperature requirements. Temperatures above 36C most plants will not flower. Temperatures below 7C most plants will cease growing.

Humidity - Insufficient humidity in the air makes it difficult to maintain an even water supply to the plants. The potting medium dries out quickly and plants rapidly lose water through their foliage. Excessive humidity will create botrytis fungus unless good air movement can be maintained and other preventive methods introduced.

Watering - Overwatering can be suspected when a plant is not making vigorous new growth. If older leaves are soft and yellow examine the potting medium for breakdown and if so repot.

Nutrition - Plants that are loosely potted will suffer from lack of minerals and probably water. Plants potted in bark can suffer from lack of Nitrogen which also causes yellowing of the leaves. Most fertilizers prepared for bark contain higher concentration of Nitrogen because of inherent lack of Nitrogen in the bark.

'Watch' for :-

Ethylene gas which is used to ripen green fruit.(is essentially an aging process.) This gas is present in smog and in fumes from the incomplete combustion of Hydrocarbons (coal, oil, gas, petrol etc)

Virus infections can be spread to other plants by contaminated cutting tools and also by aphids which are particularly dangerous since certain species are known to be vectors of certain diseases.

The first step in control is to isolate the diseased plant and maintain the preventive procedures.

Pythium Black Rot and Damp Off - a water mould, pythium ultimum causes this disease. High humidity and cool temperatures favour it. - use Natriphene or Zineb.

Collar Rot - caused by fungus sclerotium rolfsii and is allied to Basal Rot. - use Natriphene or Zineb.

Root Rot - caused by fungus pellicularia filamentosa. The brown mycelium infects roots and up into the rhizome - use Natriphene or Zineb.

Fusarium Wilt and Root Rot fungus fusarium oxyporum and
fusarium moniliforme infect the
plants through the roots. A
purple discoloration appears in
the outer layer of the rhizome.
Cut all diseased tissue off and
any diseased looking roots.
