DAYTIME CHAPTER R.& B. Clark

28 Members were welcomed to the meeting by Keith Northcote with special greetings to Dale Cook and Lesley Gunn (committee members), Mr and Mrs Jue, and the afternoon's special speaker, Thoral Tormet and her husband Harry. Apologies were received from Peg and Glenn Gilchrist.

The position of Daytime Convenor is still vacant. Keith has offered to help his successor if only one can be found.

Thoral gave a very interesting and informative talk on miscellaneous, cool-growing orchids.

With over 25,000 different varieties from 750 genera orchids can be found growing in almost all climatic conditions. There are terrestrial (growing in the ground), epiphytes (on trees), and lithophytes (on rocks).

Beside the natural hybrids, man has made at least 100,000 named hybrids with 1,000 or more being added each year.

'How do you choose which orchid to grow?' Thoral asked. Check the conditions necessary for their healthy culture and if you can supply these then go ahead with your personal choice.

It is well known that cymbidiums grow well in our climate but here are others that have bought much pleasure to growers:-

Bletilla striata (Chinese ground orchid):- a hardy terrestrial, with mauve flowers about linch high like miniature cattleyas. (the white variety are not quite as hardy).

Epidendrums, specially the orange Boundii and the red O'Brienianum will grow outside in the ground. Encyclia family, flower about Christmastime. Includes Enc. cochleata (the cockleshell orchid), Enc. radiata, and Enc. fragrans. (All creamy with various markings). Enc. alata and Enc. tampense have long lasting flowers.

Laelia anceps, L. gouldiana and L. autumnalis can be grown out in the garden in pots, baskets or mounted on slabs of tree-fern. These laelias originated in Mexico and do well in cool conditions but those from Brazil need more heat to do well.

Ansellia africana (the leopard orchid) is transformed when in bloom with its masses of perfumed yellow flowers, barred with brown.

The genus **Brassia** (spider orchid) is easy to grow. In summer it has long racemes of creamy, whitegreen, spidery, long lasting, perfumed flowers.

Oncidiums (dancing ladies). Onc. flexuosum and varicosum are similar. They flower in winter with semi-pendulous spikes and many flowers.

Onc. ornithorhynchum has soft mauve flowers in autumn.

Bifrenaria harrisoniae with its creamy, fleshy, waxy flowers is

sweetly perfumed and longlasting.

Zygopetalum mackayi and Z. intermedium are both perfumed and will grow quite happily with the cymbidiums.

Paphiopedilum insigne and Paph. villosum are also worth a try.

Many thanks to Thoral for this informative talk were expressed by those present.

Of the benched orchids Thoral agreed with the members' choice in selecting C.& H. Edwards' Lc. Amber Glow 'Olaa'. Second place was shared by Berna & Harry Viney's C. Kew and Keith Northcote's Phalaenopsis.

After the raffle a chat and a cuppa rounded off the afternoon.

QUESTION TIME

H.J. Edwards

A member recently asked me what to do as she had lost a couple of new growths on her Cattleya plants due to rot.

I told her that we have had the same experience and it is due, in our opinions, to water being left in the axil of the plant. We go around our collection after watering and endeavour to blow excess water out, with the aid of a drinking straw, but time does not always permit this. An occasional dose of Fongarid may also help.

PAPHIOPEDILUM rothschildianum by B. Wyly

Quite often paphiopedilum species are seen on our benches and it is interesting to learn a little about them.

Paphiopedilum rothschildianum is one of the beautiful multi floral species found in nature, growing on mountain sides at an elevation of 2,000-4,000 feet at Sabah, North Borneo. It grows into a large plant with long, green, lustrous leaves. The flower stem is robust and up to 60cms tall bearing 2 - 5 flowers. The dorsal sepal is long, pinched, pointed at the apex, pale yellowish white with white margin, has purplish black vertical stripes. Petals are long, narrow, and twisted with lines of dark brown spots. The labellum is large, of heavy texture, cinnamon brown with dark brown veining and a prominent median line. The ventral sepal although shorter than the dorsal is similar in shape and colour. Paph. rothschildianum was named after Baron Ferdinand Rothschild in England and was

bought into collections there

around 1880 - 1890. Its origins were somewhat clouded due to the early collectors and growers concealing its whereabouts in the wild. Some said it originated in New Guinea others in Bornea. Paph. rothschildianum is said to be difficult to get to flower. This is possibly partially due to the fact that the plant needs to have several growths before flowering but also because some clones may be naturally shy bloomers or others once they do flower may do so on a regular basis from then on. It needs warm - hot, humid conditions to bloom successfully. Early records suggest a slight drying out and cool nights in Spring to encourage its summer flowering. There are several excellent named clones of the species under cultivation e.g. Paph. rothschildianum 'Borneo', 'Charles E', 'Cowan', 'Nuana', 'Tacoma', 'Tenys' and 'Tip Top'.
