The Month of February

Much the same as previous month, could even be hotter - watch for disfiguring sun burn, if extra shade was not applied last month then do so this month. Sun burn will not permanently damage a plant but will damage leaves to the extent that they cannot do their job of photosyynthisis with the reresultant effect on flower production. However do not go overboard with the shade as these orchids requireas bright a light as possible short of actual burning. Water regularly and give a weak feed of a fertilizer if you wish, be careful not to over fertilize the aim is to produce hard firm stems and leaves, too much fertilizer will produce soft lush growth at the expense of flowers

#### CYMBIDIUM GROWING AND FEEDING for the Month of February

- 1. Heavy watering is required to keep up the humidity
- 2. Watch out that you have sufficient shading
- 3. Fertilizer, lower nitrogen and use one of a more even NPK ratio. Consider a weak foliar spray weekly of such a fertilizer.
- 4. Watch out for pest and use an insecticide and fungicide as per manufacture's direction. As necessary.
- 5. Those early cyms are showing spike(Peter Pan and hybrids, Minuet etc) so take care when you are watering, ferilizing and spraying for pest if you do not want damaged spikes.

# SEASONAL HINTS FOR YOUR CATTLEYAS (and cattleya alliance) by H

These hints are for plants grown on the Adelaide plains

#### JANUARY & FEBRUARY: -

Many cattleyas flower during autumn and early winter and are now making strong growths and roots. Keep them moving with plenty of moisture both in the pots and around them, especially with high temperatures prevailing.

½ strength liquid fertilizer each 2-3 weeks will help the flower quality.

DON'T fertilize if the compost is dry, water first and then follow with the feeding programme next day.

Watch for sunburn - leaves of cattleyas burn badly if direct rays of the sun shine through unpainted glass. Unsightly black blotches soon appear. Keep a watch for tell tale signs of various types of caterpillers, they can ruin flowers quickly.

Always watch out for mealy bug and paticularly scale. Maldison (Malithion) is an effective spray, should insecticides be needed. There are several systemic type sprays availaable which are also very effective. EVERY SRAY SHOULD BE ONLY USED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE MAKERS DIRECTION AND THE NECESSARY SAFETY PRECAUTION TAKE.

The first people to discover the genus 'Miltonia' were those collectors of orchids and botanists who traversed South America and in particular Colombia and Brazil. It is not a genus where one sees flowering plants in abundance either at monthly meetings of the Clubs or for that matter at any of the Shows -only the odd plant is exhibited. It is not surprising therefore that the writers first contact with a plant was shall we say fortuitous. On unpacking a parcel received from an interstate nursery, it was found to contain a small plant of a Miltonia - a 'discovery' which at the time did not create any excitement or indeed enthusiasm. The opinion held was that these plants required special conditions and were difficult to grow.

The small plant was placed amongst the odontoglossums and just had to take its chance. Surprisingly, it prospered and now after three years it is well developed and of flowering size. Miltonias come from two distinct areas namely Brazil and Colombia. The Brazillian genus is regarded as a 'warm' grower and when flowered the dorsal sepal is rounded and generally in relation to the petals presents a well filled in concept. The Colombian form is not so well filled in. The Beall Orchid Company catalogue has this to say of the Colombian variety.

'This group of Miltonias has now been recognized as a separate genus. These are what have been tradionally known as Colombian or 'cool' Miltonias. Daytime temperatures should not exceed 80F and nightime temperatures should be 50-60F. Keep low to moderate bright light and the moisture constant to ensure success. If grown correctly, Miltonias will flower in the autumn as well as the spring.'

In another catalogue issued by the same firm the following additional comments relating to Colombian Miltonias are made:-

'Daytime temperatures higher that 78F should be coupled with abundant cooling fresh air from an outside source. Air turbulators and fans providing rapid air movement will also keep your plants happy and healthy. Light levels slightly lower than cattleyas gives us sturdy growths and high flower count. Miltonias should be constantly moist and a humidity level of 55 - 65% should be maintained.'

In 1983 I was persuaded to purchase some Colombian Miltonias and these were placed alongside the 'orphan'. Some of these have now flowered - one with two spikes each hearing three flowers and another one spike with two flowers. The plants flowered give encouragement to better things to come. For example the 1984 RHS awards included an AM for a plant Milt. Robert Strauss 'Ardingly'. It carried three spikes and 13 flowers in all. The natural spread of this flower was 10.7 cm. With 13 flowers on 3 spikes it can be assumed that one of the infloresences carried 5 flowers and the number of flowers and the spread of the flower would have given it full points if juded for an award.

If growers can awhieve a similar flowering result, surely a goal well worth aiming for. Mericlones and seedlings are available in limited supply from a local nursery.

The heading 'Discovering the genus Miltonia' now becomes apparent in that I have 'discovered' quite by accident that the genus is not as difficult to cultivate as first imagined and whilst you will not become 'rich' from the sale of the flowers. Certainly your collection will be the 'richer' by their inclusion.
