We will need all the help possible during show ween, so gave your names, dates and times to our Show Marshal Mr. Keith Shaw Ph. 83 3056, so that a rostor can be made up. Members are needed to make and sell sprays, flowers, and raffle tickets, help with the potting demonstrations and selling of plants etc. and we must get a rostor worked out beforehand so that we have help arranged for every hour of every day.

All available plants will be needed in the show, we cannot all grow champion blocms, but every plant is needed to fill in the space, including ferns and foliage plants. If TRANSPORT is needed, notify Keith, Ph-83 3056 All pots should be marked with your club number, and the Show Marshal will arrange the class markings. Novice will be Green, Seedlings med, and the open section will be unmarked.

SHOW TIPS by Bernie Hansen

Well, it's finally here, our years growing is coming into fruition or as some growers will say 'I have nurtured this plant for 3 years', because in most cases a divided plant flowers better the 2nd and 3rd. year after being divided.

I do hope every body has had a good look at the plan of the show at Marion, worked out the size of exhibit they have, and put some thought into how they are going to display their Orchids.

Perhaps we should take a general view of 'what is an Orchid show?'

- 1. It is somewhere where members can put on show their plants.
- 2. There is the fun of winning prizes (and bragging a little).
- 3. Bringing our effort of joy to the Public
- 4. The chance of getting more people interested in the growing of Orchids.

So it is to our advantage to display our Orchids to their best advantage.

As we have to supply our own backdrop material, I have been constantly on the alert to find large pines etc. at nurseries who are selling them at reasonable prices, and these are few and far between. So contact the exhibitor who is back to back with your exhibit and find what sort of back drop material he is using, may be you can combine your backdrop material and work in with one another. Perhaps a list of material of needy items to take along to the Marion Shopping Centre on 'put in day' will help.

Orchid plants of all descriptions (Flowering of course)
Ferns large and small, shrubs in pots, indoor plants, and MOSS.

Staging Material

Extra pots or blocks to raise pots to just the right height. Short planks, ½ crates, in fact anything from that will give your exhibit varying heights.

Tissying up Material

White oil, bucket, rag, roll of tissue paper, a heap of old NEWSPAPERS Twisties, extra stakes, watering can, Wiss Orchid shears or similar, Plus 2 or 3 dozen approx. 5" pieces of wire to clip the hessian to the pots.

Theme Materials

Ponds can be made by using a ring of support material plus a sheet of plastic. When filled with water, sprinkle some sand or gravel to give the bottom a natural look. When mossing around the edge of the pool, do not let the moss touch the water as capillary action will syphon the water out of the pool.

The limb of a tree can be used as a tree by nailing a cross shape base to it. Moss and plants can be draped on the branches, and when placed out hear the edge of the exhibit, the whole effect is much better. Statues can be used but be careful, if fir argument you decide to do a Grecian scene, broken pillars, urns etc. would be useful adornments, but too big or too many nic-macs would wuin the whole effect. In my opinion miniature models etc. are all out of proportion and do not really compliment the exhibit.

SHOW TIPS cont.

As some of you know, moss is not the only material for covering up pots. If you do wish to go to something else, perhaps a sandy beach scene with a few tufts of reed type grass to cover up the pots; an Autumn scene with leaves (collected last Autumn) sprinkled over and around the pots do a good job. Potted ground cover plants will also do a good cover up job. There must be lots of other materials that will fill in to your theme. P.S. Do not use Isolite for a winter scene otherwise it will be a big snow job.

For the inexperienced and those that know, take a good look at the exhibits at the Orchid Festival in John Martins the prior week, and maybe you will be inspired to do something really great.

All the best for a good show, let's make this one a beaut.
