#### CULTURAL REMINDERS FOR CYMBIDIUM GROWERS FOR MONTH OF OCTOBER -

- 1. Increase watering and humidity.
- 2. Watch out for sunburn on leaves
- 3. Continue with the 'High Nitrogen Fertiliser' programme.
- 4. Watchout for 'Aphids' and 'Redspider', take immediate action when seen.
- Continue with repotting.

Cymbidiums are in need of repotting when:-

- 1. They have outgrown their pots.
- 2. The mix has broken down.
- The plant appears to be in poor or run down condition, this is the time to inspect the root system.

#### Steps in repotting: -

- a. Remove all of the old mix.
- b. Divide plants as necssary, where possible to 3-4 green bulb divisions
- c. Remove Allold and dead roots
- c. Tidy up plants, remove back bulbs, clean off husks & leafs.
- e. Select a pot that will allow at least for 2-3 years growing.
- f. Place division in pots so that the new growth will grow to the centre pack tight plant with the new compost so that the plant is steady if need be use a stake to keep the plant steady.
- g. Keep the repotted plants well shaded and donot water only mist for the next couple of weeks.
- h. Make sure you correctly 'label' all division & back bulbs.
- i. Before starting another plant remove all plant refuse and sterilse by heat any tools that you have use to cut.
- j. Cover any bare wound on the divisions with 'sulphur' or with a proprietory line such as 'steri-prune'.

SPRING SHOW REPORT 1985.

Show Marshall: STEPHEN MONKHOUSE.

This year's theme 'ORCHIDS IN THE GRAND PRIX' has been supported by exhibitors extremely well, with many different ideas.

A few members used racing tracks and cars, while others used posters and parts of cars. Two exhibits which caught my eye were John Nicholls and Keith Northcotes 'Orchid Car' in open division, and Mrs. B.E. Anderson's in second division, using a racing track with car, black tyre bridge and racing helmet, both very well done.

Congratulations has to be extended to the Mills, and Trus Families in Open Division, Ray Goodall and his wife in Second Division, Toni DiOnno and Dick Styles in First Division each receiving best display in their divisions. Congratulations of-course goes to Vick Haskard who received Grand Champion of the Show with Cymbidium Ruby Anniversary 'Pink Perfection'.

Congratulations to all exhibitors, winners or not for the high standard of plants displayed. This year we have a new prize which was awarded to Ian and Angie O'Daniel for the exhibitor who receives the most prizes with individual plants. Congratulations Ian and Angie and thanks must be extended to the sponsor of this prize, W.A. YOUNG & CO.

Support from exhibitors during set up night was well attended with each division being responsible for their own area. After one hour of consciencous work all was nearly completed. Thanks to all concerned for their time and efforts.

#### Extract from August 1985 Townsville Orchid Society Bulletin .: -

"Did you know that the largest orchid in the world is GRAMMATOPHYLLUM WALLISII 'Burnham' FCC/BCM/CCC/RHS? The species bloomed for the first time in England in August 1982 and again in August 1984. It is a native of Mindanao in the Philippines.

It is one of the 'sugar cane' type Grammatophyllums, the largest of the orchid family. They are so large, they are rarely seen in private collections special houses being required in botanical gardens to house them.

These are the first two recorded bloomings of the plant in cultivation and now, of coarse, they are an endangered species in the wild. In fact they may be lost for ever.

The plant had been growing in England at Burnham Nurseries in Devon for 15 years, so you can imagine the excitement when in 1982 the gentle giant consisting of 27 canes, the longest nearly 9ft tall, burst into bloom. The canes were 6 inches thick! It just didn't give one spike, it decided really to turn on a display - it produced 9 spikes each 6ft and a total of 557 flowers each 3 inches across. Sepals and petals were off-white, spotted with dark maroon/brown. The lip was dark red.

It was such an event that it featured in the press and on TV and was awarded the highest accolade of the Royal Horticultural Society - its FCC - an honour rarely given. In 1984 it had five spikes. It has been entered in the Guiness Book of Records.

In the wild they grow or grew on giant ironwood trees as epiphytes however, if the tree dies or falls over, the orchids continue to grow as terrestrials

This month we saw a fine specimen of Dendrobium tetragonum on the Open Division bench. This denrobium was grown by L & R Moore, belongs to the species occuring in the temperate and sub-tropical regions of Eastern Australia, this orchid is found from the Illawara district, north along coastal N.S.W. to Queensland. It divides into two vatieties, var 'tomentosum' which has a 'felted' labellum, and var 'giganteum' with flowers to 10cms across, greenish marked with red The type form has small spidery yellow, green, red and white flowers.

Den tetragonum has distinctly four-sided stems, narrow at the base then widening before terminating in two to four dark green attractive leaves. In spring the very attractive, fragrant, spider-like flowers grow from nodes near the end of the stem.

The common name for this orchid is <u>tree-spider orchid</u> or alternatively <u>tea-tree orchid</u>, so named because it is commonly found growing on tea-trees.

Den tetragonum has been used quite extensively in hybridising in recent years, mainly for its ability to flower more than once each year. Some of the more notable hybrids using Den tetragonum are:-

- D. HILDA POXON = D tetragonum X D speciosum, a prolific show-bench winner.
- D. ALLYN STAR = D Gracillimum X D tetragonum
- D. BLUSHING STAR = D Suffusum X D tetragonum
- D. STAR of GOLD = D falcorostrum X D tetragonum
- D. PEEWEE = D bigibum X D tetragonum Note D Gracillimum natural hybrid (gracilicaule x speciosum) D Suffusum = natural hybrid (gracicaule x kingianum)
