Oncidium is a very large &
varied genus of over 400 species
of epiphytal orchids, found
growing throughout the whole of
Central America, from Mexico and
the West Indies to the Southern
parts of Brazil.

The flowers of the different species vary greatly in size, shape, and colour. Some are borne in profusion on long branched scapes, others 2-3 on short stems. Colours in the main, are yellow and brown, although some species are white or rose coloured. Some are fragant. The size varies from very small to very large. In the greater number of species the growth and habit is very similar to that of Odontoglossums to which they are closely related, and with which they have been interbred, producing many hybrids.

Oncidium sphacelatum was first sent to London from Mexico in 1840. It has pseudobulbs 10-15cms, leaves 40-60cms long, with flower scapes 1-2 metres, branched and many flowered. The flowers are about 3cms across, sepals and petals dark chestnut brown barred with yellow, yellow on the reflexed tips, lip golden yellow, with a reddish band in front of the crest.

The very fine specimen plant in the 2nd Division Bench, grown by Richard Wilson, was named Registrar's Choice, Flower of the Month, for November. The four suberect, branched flower scapes bore scores of well-formed, brightly coloured, brown barred with yellow flowers. All flowers were fresh and in Al condition.

# CULTIVATION OF THE ODONTOGLOSSUM ALLIANCE IN ADELAIDE by Roger Herraman

The Odontoglossum Alliance is a surprisingly easy & rewarding group of orchids to grow. They require NO heating during the colder months of the year & with a

bit of inventiveness can be kept a little cooler over summer.

The alliance itself contains many genera which, for the most part, interbreed quite freely. Some of the more commonly grown ones are Odontoglossum, Oncidium, Miltonia, & Brassia.

The growing area does need to be elaborate. A fibreglass or glass roofed enclosure with some weather-proof material on the southern side & perhaps the western walls, & 50% shadecloth on the other 2 sides is a starting point. During the summer a piece of 50% shadecloth should be put over the roof. This can be removed around Easter & refitted late September/early October. During periods of extreme heat in summer, extra shading may be required to help keep the plants cooler, together with damping down of the whole growing area.

Watering need not be regular for Odonts. than most other orchid genera. Mine are watered at the same time as all other plants including Cyms. & Native Epiphytes. I like to dampen down the whole growing house early in the morning on very hot summer days. I'm not keen on misting because of fungal problems associated with a saturated atmosphere. I would rather rely on rising moisture from the floor for extra humidity required on hot days. During winter I prefer to water either by dipping the pots into water or gently using a watering can so as not to wet the leaves, thus minimising rot fungal problems. For the rest of the year the hose is used. I use rainwater as much as possible.

For fertilising I believe in the old adage of 'a little used often'. A variety of diet seems to suit them well & always apply at a lesser strength then recommend. Odonts. are not heavy feeders. I use fairly even N-P-K ratio fertilisers with an occasional

high nitrogen brand perhaps every 4th or 5th time I feed.

Potting medium is always a contentious subject, however I think simplicity is the key. The ingredients should be of a free draining nature, consistent in quality & readily available. My mix is simply fine & medium grade pine bark, charcoal & rice hulls. I use the same mix for all size plants except for the very large mature plants where I add extra medium bark. In the bottom of the pot I put a handful of foam pieces to aid drainage & keep the roots clean & healthy. Potting is done throughout the year except during the hottest part of summer. The ideal time to re-pot is when the new growths are about 3-4 inches high. At this stage the growths will be starting their new root system & will establish in the new medium fairly quickly.

Before preparing the potting mixture for use I firstly soak the bark in boiling water to which is added a little lime-sulphur fungicide & urea. This is left for a couple of days, then drained & rinsed. The lime-sulphur usually fixes any unknown nasties in the bark & the urea adds a little nitrogen to the brew right from the start.

I have found over the years that the intergeneric hybrids are generally a little easier to grow than the straight Odontoglossums Adelaide. The very large, filled-in & rounded type of Odonts.seen today are derived from several very cool growing species from Columbia in South America. The most commonly used species has been Odont. crispin which, in its natural habitat, has a very narrow temperature range. This range is only possible here with the aid of a controlled environment house. The Central American species tolerate a far greater range of temperatures & are quite easily grown here. Odontiodas, which are a hybrid between Odontoglossum & Cochlioda, are a more warmth

tolerant group & can withstand our summers fairly well. Even more hardy in our conditions are the Wilsonaras which combine 3 genera; Odontoglossum, Cochlioda & Oncidium - & Odontocidiums which are Oncidium & Odontoglossum.

Intergeneric hybrids containing Brassia are also very hardy & usually have a vigorous growth habit producing very large bulbs. Examples of this group include Miltassia, Brassidium, Odontobrassia & Maclellenara.

I belive that one species alone has done more to make this whole alliance of orchids far easier to grow in our climate & helped to produce plants which are hardy, floriferous with lasting flowers & infinite variations in colour & shape- than any other single species. That orchid is Oncidium tigrinum ( or more accurately Oncidium tigrinum var. unguiculatum). Taken on its own it is an attractive if not a particularly spectacular flower smallish & not very colourful. There are certainly many Oncidium species which , in my view, are infinately more desirable. However, when this species combined with large, well rounded & brightly coloured Odontiodas, it produces Wilsonaras which generally have most the colour of Odontioda, long branching spikes, flowers around 3 to 3.5 inches across which will last in good condition for up to 10 weeks during the cooler months of the year. So, if you looking for a suitable starting point in growing these plants keep an eye out for anything with Onc. tigrinum as a parent grandparent & you should have no trouble.
