QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

How can I find the registered name for my Orchid?

The South Coast Orchid Club has the full set of Sanders List of Orchid Hybrids. These contain the registered name of every orchid hybrid that has been registered. Some of our Members also have, or have access to, The Royal Horticultural Society CD and I'm sure, if asked they also would help. By using the Sanders books or CD it is possible to trace the parentage of all orchids back to the species.

Should I allow moss or lichen to grow around the top of my pots?

Moss or lichen will eventually clog the potting mix causing excess water to be held during winter and eventually root damage

I have trouble finding a place to buy Fongarid

or Previoure. Where can I purchase them? Try the local Supermarkets and Garden Centres first but if still no joy I find Nelson & Carr of Kent Town worth a try. They have all sorts of 'goodies'.

After mixing Fongarid how long can I keep the solution?

All insecticides and fungicides lose effect over a period of time, some as short as a few hours. For safety reasons be very careful where you store these products.

I noticed at an Orchid Club meeting that an unnamed plant gained a prize. What are the rules here?

A plant with no name can become Grand Champion of a Show, if it is good enough.

I live near the beach and wondered if salt laden winds will harm my orchids?

Some orchids in the tropics grow almost down to the sea edge without any visible damage. It would probably depend on which genera you were growing and how adaptable they were.

SARCOCHILUS

Only having one Sarcochilus plant until fairly recently, when I suddenly had quite a few to care for, I thought it about time I looked into the cultivation of these little lovelies.

Basically these plants are cool to cold growing little vandaceous orchids. The Sarcanthe group are easy to grow if this is kept in mind. Plants prefer fairly heavy shade, up to 80% shadecloth

is necessary, and even full shade in the afternoon is preferable to the hot summer sun.

They also like air movement. Drainage must be perfect. This group tend to do most of their growing in autumn rather than spring so repotting and fertilising should be concentrated around this time too. Use fertiliser sparingly as the fleshy roots will burn easily.

Most pests and diseases are not a problem with sarcs but keep an eye out for scale and mealy bug. At this time of the year a few spikes should be appearing so keep an eye out for them too.

PHALAENOPSIS violacea

Extracts from an article written by John Marsh, who is a AOC Judge and Member of several SA Orchid Clubs.

Ever wondered about the distinct change of colour on the bottom half of the lateral sepals of some of the brightly coloured Phalaenopsis? Well, it can be attributed to *Phalaenopsis violacea*.

violacea is a plant that now is being used by hybridists to a greater extent for novelty type breeding with some startling results.

Now to step back a little in time to the discovery of this species which as in those early days of orchidology was somewhat confusing. The species was initially found by the collector Mr Teijsmann in an area of Sumatra in about 1859, the habitat was a shaded area by a running stream. These plants were sent to a collector, Mr Witte of the Botanical Gardens of Leiden, Netherlands (Holland). They were flowered in 1860 and the plant was described and painted in colour by Witte and given the name *Phalaenopsis violacea*.

Since 1859 violacea has been found in other areas adjacent to the island of Sumatra including Borneo and the Malayan peninsular. This would indicate that the requirements for culture would be tropical in nature.

To describe the plant in general, the leaves of this epiphytic monopodial plant are light green and oblong, elliptic in shape, approximately 20cm to 25cm long and 7cm to 12cm wide. The inflorescence is sub erect with only a few fleshy flowers. The flowers do vary in characteristics from one area to another but in general are 50mm to 80mm across with a background colour of cream to green with a magenta overlay.

There are two main forms of the species that are in cultivation, the Borneo form and the Malayan form. These forms or types are distinguished by their size and colouration. The Borneo form is the larger flowering of the two with a distinct magenta colour being confined to the centre of the flower and the lower half of the lateral sepals, and the malayan form being the smaller flower with the magenta colour radiating from the centre of the flower.

Taking into account the environment of violacea the cultural requirements can be determined. The species is found growing in a tropical environment at a lower altitude under heavy shading usually in a high humidity area by a stream. Taking this into account we must supply cultural conditions similar to that required for other species of Phalaenopsis, a minimum of 15C with a humidity of between 50m - 80%. The shading requirements are somewhat different. My plant of violacea grows a lot better under a solid bench than on top of it, even though the temperature may be a degree or two lower.

As stated previously *Phalaenopsis violacea* is now being used more in the breeding of novelty type hybrids. One of the earlier crossings was *Phalaenopsis* Princess Kauilani, a crossing of *violacea* and *amabilis*. The progeny varies in colour from a blue to a red depending on the use of Borneo form (blue colouration) or Malayan form (Red colouration) of *Phalaenopsis violacea*. As early as 1945 this species had been used 3 times as a parent but by 1997 the count was over 2,000.

Phalaenopsis violacea is certainly proving a great parent of novelty Phalaenopsis.
