CYMBIDIUM PLANT REQUIREMENTS - OCTOBER & NOVEMBER.

1. Feed at least once a week with a balanced 'high nitrogen' fertiliser.
2. During this period at least once give a feed of 'iron chelate'.
2. Feed at least once a month with 'manganese sulphate'.
4. Include with one of the fertiliser 'epsom salts' at the rate of one teaspoons to 5 litres of water.
5. Spray an insecticide spray three times five days apart, use either a spreader or white oil to give a better coverage, make sure to give the underside of all the leaves a good drenching also the bulbs.
6. Have the compost slightly acid.

These are a few pointer that may help you have a better flowering season next year. If you were satisfied with this last year then stick with your programme. Good Luck.

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OCTOBER'S GROWING TIPS FOR AUSTRALIAN EPIPHYTES

Flowering continues into this month (this particular year is an exception most plants appear to be very slow in flowering, later than normal). As flowering finishes repotting can take place where it is necessary. Cut off old flower spikes, prepare the new compost consisting of medium grade pine bark with the addition of some charcoal and pea size gravel.

Knock the plant out of the pot, cut off any dead roots, place the plant in a pot just a little larger than the one it was removed from, slowly dribble in the compost making sure that it percolates between the roots, tapping the pot on the bench as you proceed, the repotted plant should be potted to the same level as it was previously growing. Give a thorough watering and place it in a slightly shaded area for a couple of weeks until it is established.

Do not break up your plants when repotting unless they are of an unmanageable size, as our native orchids look best when they reach a large size.

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CATTLEYA NOTES FOR OCTOBER

All plants are now making new roots and new growths, so unless repotting or breaking up it is necessary to keep the groths growing quickly with moisture and regular feeding programmes.

When feeding the plants do so after watering the previous day or so and feed at less than is generally quoted on the container.

It is also a good time to clean up the benches, place gravel or shell grit, make sure misters etc. are in working order as they will gradually be needed with warmer summer days ahead. Also check up on glasshouse shading, as either painting the glass or covering with shade cloth needs to be considered around about November.

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The Club has been given permission to reprint the following article as published in the ORCHID NEWS, from the Orchid Society of NSW Ltd. in the May 1986 copy. We hope that by doing so it may help some one, as it gives another person's method of culture.

CATTLEYA AND ALLIANCE

As well as the better known members of this alliance such as *Brassavola*, *Cattleya*, *Laelia* and *Sophranitis*, I consider *Broughtonia*, *Diacrium*, *Encyclia* and *Epidendrum* to be part of the alliance when crossed with the main members of the alliance, even though they are not recognised as such at the moment. As these latter genera become more popular in hybridising I think they must be recognised as part of the alliance.

HOUSING: Contrary to popular belief, many *Cattleya* species can be grown cold or cool. A number of *Cattleya*s may be grown for a short time in cold conditions down to 0°C providing they are not exposed to frost. This may be achieved in a bush house by enclosing southern end and part of the roof with fibreglass. In frosty weather, it is better to keep plants moist rather than dry as a protection from frost burn. Commercial growers in America have automatic misters and watering systems which operate when the temperature drops below a certain level to prevent frost burn on orchids.

HEATING: In my warm glasshouse, I have a gas flame heater. If it were turned on and off, it would allow ethylene gas to escape during pre-ignition which would damage the plants and turn the foliage yellow. My therostatically controlled heat is left on throughout Winter. Compared to other sources of heat, gas is the most economical, costing about \$150 for the season. I believe the optimum system to use is gas hot water system with pipes circulating throughout the glasshouse, however this would be rather expensive to use. I also have a fan blowing through the glasshouse continuously to maintain a minimum temperature variation of 2°C. The fan also helps to keep down fungus.

SEEDLINGS: If you are going to buy flasks of *Cattleya* species, make sure the plants have a good root growth before deflasking. Remove the plants in early Autumn of Spring or even in Summer. Try not to disturb the plants in Winter when the losses are greater. When deflasking, I make up a solution of Benlate and Previcur and soak the deflasked plants in the solution. I then replant them into 140mm squat community pots, with coarse bark in the bottom, and a mixture of medium/fine bark, charcoal and cork, and topped off with fine bark. I usually pot about ten plants together and then spray with a fungicide such as Fongarid and RDO fertiliser - this helps the plants to get

started. I leave the plants in the community pots until they are "bursting out". They seem to enjoy each others company and grow very well together. Perhaps it is because the roots take on the nutrients in the mixture more quickly and prevent it from going sour, which helps them grow so well.

REPOTTING: I have found American Sequoia bark to be the best quality bark available as a potting medium. For drainage I now use blue metal as it has no chemical components to harm the plants. I also use natural cork, medium bark and charcoal in the following proportions -

1/5 charcoal 6mm diam - 16mm diam.

2/5 granulated cork 6mm - 16mm diam.

2/5 bark 6mm - 16mm diam.

Mixed together, then sprinkled on top with a light layer of peat moss and teased out sphagnum moss, then mixed again. I moisten the mixture before using it and this helps keep the peat moss and sphagnum moss evenly distributed. I use plastic pots with a dome in the centre for added drainage. For watering purposes, it is best to use one type of pot either plastic or terracotta. I believe in one watering system for my plants and this cannot be achieved when both types of pots are used together. Plants should be potted firmly in this compost, and firmly staked and tied. Whenever using stakes to groom your flowers always sharpen the stake before pushing into the compost. If a root is cut it will be a clean cut not "squashed" and less damage will be caused to the plant.

INSECTICIDES: My favourite insecticide is Lannate L. It is good for scale, mealy bugs and other pest with the exception of the red spider mite. This solution is very dangerous and a proper safety mask with cartridge must be worn with a spray suit, or at least a rain coat, wellington boots, hat, glasses and gloves. The solution is lethal, but it dissipates very quickly and it is safe to walk in the greenhouse the day after spraying.

FUNGICIDES: I use Previcur, Benlate, Fongarid, Natriphene and several others. There are so many different types of fungi that it is almost impossible to say which is the best solution to use at any one time. Watch for black root on your plants. A very dark spot appearing on the foliage means you should cut back that leaf area. If there is still black through the edge of the cut foliage then you have not cut back enough. You must be ruthless when it comes to treating pests and diseases. Orthene is very good for caterpillars. I do not have a regular spray routine. I only

spray when I see something which needs to be treated.

STERILISING: Cutting instruments can be sterilized in two ways. By flame - metholated spirit, gas, butane etc for approximately two minutes. Or by soaking in a solution of 10ml Dettol/500ml water (use only cut foliage - Dettol is oil-based and will damage roots). 10-15ml household bleach/100ml water can be used to cut foliage or root. Allow our cutting instruments to dry before using them. If you wish to soak for any length of time, do not soak in bleach - it will rust metal.

FERTILISING: I believe that a mixed diet of fertiliser is best. Whilst using a good commercial fertiliser I found the foliage on my plants was light in colour and that the plants were lacking in trace elements. I have since returned to Aquasol which has ample trace elements. In Spring and Summer I fertilise every week at ¼ strength using Aquasol, Nitriphoska Blue and Maxicrop on a rotating basis. Maxicrop has more trace elements than fish emulsion, it has nearly as much nitrogen and it does not smell as much. I mix the fertilizer concentrate in hot water first and this seems to blend the solution better. I then spray my plants with an apportioner which blends the concentrate solution with cold water. The concentrate takes the chill of the water. To help the flowering, I also use Campbells Yellow.

LIGHT REQUIREMENTS: *Cattleya* species should be grown with as much as light as possible, but not so much that the plant will burn. Light will make up for loss of heat. If using as evaporative cooler in the glasshouse, the plants can be grown in more light. With such a cooler, do not seal your glasshouse - always have a vent open at the opposite end. My glasshouse has vents under the benches and in the roof. have the air from the cooler flowing under the benches and up through the plants.

I also have misting system to help bring down the temperature. On very hot days, do not mist your glasshouse in the mid-day - this will 'cook' the plants. It is better to mist in the early morning or late afternoon. To help reduce the temperature in a hot glasshouse, place a garden sprinkler on the roof or position your shade cloth a distance away from the glass - both these methods will help bring down the temperature.

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'Cattleya-type'

The term 'Cattleya-type' is more frequently being used and will be so in the future. Most of these 'new breed' will be shown on the bench in the section known as 'miscellaneous', is this right?

We have just started to see and discover the fascinating world of multigeneric hybrids that interbreed with cattleyas. The challenge to the hybridiser is to search out the genera that will combine to produce the 'Cattleya-type flowers, on compact plants, many of which flower several times a year, in some catalogues they are often described as being in flower continuously.

Some of the new hybrid combinations that have been registered are:-

- Hawkinsara** — (Broughtonia × Cattleya × Laelia × Sophronitis)
- Brownara** — (Broughtonia × Cattleya × Diacrium)
- Stanfieldara** — (Epidendrum × Laelia × Sophronitis)
- Rothara** — (Brassavola × Cattleya × Epidendrum × Laelia × Sophronitis)
- Mizutaara** — (Schomburgkia × Cattleya × Diacrium)
- Bishopara** — (Broughtonia × Cattleya × Sophronitis)
- Lyonara** — (Schomburgkia × Cattleya × Laelia)
- Severinara** — (Diacrium × Laelia × Sophronitis)
- Epicatonia** — (Epidendrum × Broughtonia × Cattleya)

These 'cattleya-type' plants I believe should not be confused with the 'cocktail' cattleyas e.g. 'Hazel Boyd' these are another story.

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At the show in at Colonnades did you see the two terrestrial orchids *Pleiones*. They are cold climate orchids which grow at high altitudes from Northern India, across the continent to Taiwan. They are a deciduous orchid that require to be lifted from their pots each year and repotted when growth begins as new roots come from the flowering buds or new growths.

They are available from several Victorian nurseries, so why not try them yourself?
