Ron also brought in quite a few of his beautiful plants in flower for all to look at and admire: thank you Ron for being available and taking time out for us, we all know how busy you are at the moment.

Tony Deionno was there and everyone wished him a Happy 80th birthday for Monday 14th June, Happy Birthday Tony. Peg Ven Den Broeke has returned from a holiday in Queensland, some people are lucky aren't they – nice to see you again Peg.

FLOWERING CYMS TO THEIR ULTIMATE COLOUR

Once your plant is in spike you should think about giving it more shade in order to improve the colour of the flowers. Greens will be much deeper and clearer without the muddy bronze tones if shaded down. Whites will also be a purer white if grown under more shade as high light draws out the red pigment in the flowers particularly on the back side of the sepals, making it appear stained. You don't however want to shade so heavily that the spikes become weak and soft. The trick is to have just enough light to develop strong spikes while still keeping that good, crisp, clean colour. Also, shade before the buds break sheath in order to gain the full effect. The exception to this is with red and dark pinks. For good bright colours keep those plants in high light until spikes are well extended and the buds are close to opening and you will be amazed at the colour improvement. Browns and yellows keep in the open so the cold and sun will enhance the colour.

PAPHIOPEDILUM ORCHIDS (SLIPPERS)

The Paphiopedilum genus is widely spread being found in nature from India to New Guinea and thus some species vary a little in their preference of climate.

Most hybrid 'Paphs' will grow in an unheated glass house in South Australia. They require heavy shade during the summer months and must have cool moist conditions not unlike the requirements of ferns. Of course a well ventilated, shady glass house is ideal however most Paphs can grow successfully in the same conditions as African Violets. To grow these orchids on a window ledge or similar the following preparations should be made. Select a large flat shallow tray of plastic or fibreglass preferably. Fill this tray with some decorative stones, pebbles or crushed marble and half fill the tray with water. If the tray is placed in a light but not direct sunlight, window or similar, then the Paph pots can be placed on this tray. Make sure that the bottoms of the pots are above the water level. This should now create the necessary humid conditions that slipper orchids require. Make sure that the water level is kept constant in the tray and that the orchid pots are watered regularly. The slipper orchids do not like very wet potting medium but also do not like to go completely dry; a constant damp condition is the ideal. The best potting medium is plain fir bark to which is added one quarter by volume of polystyrene foam granules to each 10 L of mix and fairly fine grade bark. This mixture should be damped down thoroughly and then placed in a clean plastic bag ready for use. Re-potting every 2 years is necessary. The orchids require fresh bark as a potting medium. Feeding for Paphs in bark is an application of Grolush Hi-nitrogen Orchid Special Fertiliser. Mix one teaspoonful with 4L of water and apply over foliage and in the pot.

GUEST SPEAKER

Iain Kilpatrick first became interested in orchids when, as a boy in the late 1940s, he wandered through the Adelaide Hills where he lived and collected and pressed orchid flowers. That interest was rekindled when he shifted to Adelaide in the early 1970s with wife Ros and was told about cymbidium orchids by a workmate. He went to see them but had no idea what he was looking for or at until it became obvious from the conversation! From a few virused backbulbs his collection expanded over the years to other genera and up to 1300 plants. His growing conditions of shade houses and glasshouses have generally been made from scrap materials, which just seemed to come his way! He tends to the 'one size fits all' approach rather than a detailed study of the requirements of each plant, so "Plant of the Night" trophies are rather hard to get. He has been a member of OCSA for over 30 years.
