After the coach, driven by a friendly and competent driver, Bill, had picked up a few members from down South and those at Marion Shopping Centre, we headed for the Burnside Shopping Centre and collected the remainder for the trip.

It was a great day for travelling, light overcast skies with patches of sunshine which always shone when we stopped at our destinations.

Our first stop was for morning tea at a little park at Summertown where some lovely cakes, etc., made by Lesley Fenton and Jane Higgs were enjoyed.

We then headed for Weald View Gardens Fuchsia Nursery at Ashton, where we enjoyed looking at and purchasing some very lovely flowers. Not many were out at this time of the year but those that were had some unusual and attractive colours.

Our next stop was at the Oakbank Hotel for lunch where the menu was either roast lamb or butterfish. Some ordered the butterfish but most, like me, ordered the lamb that simply melted in your mouth.

After this lovely meal, we boarded the

coach again and headed for Vic. Goode's house at Balhannah. Vic. grows mainly Masdevallias but he also had a few Disas and Cymbidiums.

After a pleasant time there, with the sun once again shining during the afternoon tea, we bid Vic. farewell and headed for home through the lovely green hills. Lesley, once again, had a raffle and quiz going during the trip up to Vic's and on the way home another raffle and an auction for one of Vic's Masdevallias that raised \$50.

Once again a big thanks to Lesley and Peter for organising another great trip.



THIS IS YOUR (ORCHID) LIFE LESLEY GUNN

How long have you been growing orchids?:-About 15 years. Dad started me off when he gave me his orchid collection. I'd given him his first plant years previously.

What genera do you grow?: Cymbidiums, cattleyas, zygopetalums, quite a miscellaneous collection.

Have you any favourites?: Probably the cattleyas, the little cocktail or mini types.

What sort of accommodation have you got for the collection? : I've a fibreglass house for the cattleyas and a shadehouse for the cymbidiums, both face North, not by choose by necessity. The shadehouse is 50% black shadecloth.

What mix are the orchids in?: The catts are in Van Schaik's bark and foam and the cyms etc are in bark, foam, perlite, and marble chips. I water the catts once a week in winter and 2 or 3 times a week in summer. I water the cyms weekly in winter, if needed, and daily in summer if it's hot.

What about fertiliser?: The cattleyas are fertilised weekly, weakly. The cymbidiums every couple of weeks. I use different fertilisers, I've used Charlie Carp, Aquasol, and the fertiliser that the Orchid Club of South Australia sell.

Where do you purchase most of your plants?: I guess most of them are from interstate,

especially the cattleyas, but some I buy locally, from Bill Fisher mainly.

Are you happy with the results you are getting with your orchids?: Yes, I seem to be getting more and better blooms each year. I got a Champion at the last Spring Show.

Does your husband, Bob, enjoy the orchids too?: Bob isn't involved in growing the orchids but he admires them when they are out.

What do you do with the cymbidium flowers?; After I show them I pick them and share with a neighbour.

BENCHED BLOOMS

Bifrenaria harrisoniae

A genus with about 12 species, this one from Brazil, South America.

harrisoniae is probably the best known of the genus. It was originally known as Dendrobium harrisoniae.

The ribbed pseudobulbs carry a single leaf that is often pale green/yellow due to the light it seems to need to induce flowering. The perfumed flowers are similar to cym flowers but with only 1 or 2, rarely more, per raceme. They are white/cream in color and have a downey purple lip.

We also have *Bifrenaria tyriathina*, one that is not seen very often on the bench. This one has a purple flower and is a little smaller than *harrisoniae*.

Lycaste

Native to Central and South America.

George Skinner, the famous plant collector, considered *Lycaste skinneri* so beautiful he claimed man could give his life for such an orchid.

Fred Alcorn of Sydney was well recognised for his hybrisation in this genus.

Lycastes seem to grow well in Adelaide in a cold glass house with the temperature between about 8 – 30C. We baby-sat a collection of these earlier in the year and the instructions were not to water the plants for the 6 weeks our friends were away, just water under the benches. The glass house also was home to a collection of very well grown *Sarcochilus*.

Oncidium

This a very large and varied genus of over 400 species. They are found growing throughout Central America, from Mexico and the West Indies to the southern parts of Brazil.

The flowers of the different species vary greatly in size, shape and colour, although in the main the colours are yellow/brown.

Oncidium sphacelatum, a species that is 'in spike' around town at the moment, was first sent to London from Mexico in 1840. It has pseudobulbs 10-15 cms high, leaves 40-60 cms long with flower scapes 1-2 metres

The flowers and leaves and scapes on the little species that Tony DeIonno had at the meeting would have fitted in my hand with no trouble at all.

Cymbidium Pee-Wee

I asked in this publication last month if some-one could help with a name, well, thanks to Helmuth Gerber the name I was after was *Cymbidium* Pee-Wee 'Brown Roy'. I had thought I would have been inundated with phone calls from all the cym growers.

Cymbidium Pee-Wee is a crossing of the pumilum and the Australian species madidum.

Aitkenara = Zygopetalum x Otostylis x Zygosepalum

Bollopetalum = Zygopetalum x Bollea

Cochlepetalum = Zygopetalum x Cochleanthes

Hamelwellsara = Zygopetalum x Aganisia x Batemannia x Otostylis x Zygosepalum

Propetalum = Zygopetalum x Promenaea Zygopetalum x Neogardneria

Zygocaste = Zygopetalum x Lycaste

A Grower recognised by many, a plant only seen by a few (due to the difficulty in transportation)

This beautiful specimen (the plant I mean) carried 6 spikes with

12 – 20 maroon, or red/brown, flowers per raceme, some over 1 metre long.

The parents of this cym are Doris Aurea and the species *devonianum*, It was registered by Feathehill Exotic Plants in California, USA in 1982.
