MY EXPERIENCES WITH FLORAL ART. by Joan May

In the middle of the 1960s with a three-year old daughter and a oneyear old son, I decided to take up a hobby and as I had an affinity with flowers and had complimented on large arrangements done for my local Church and had success in the garden, I decided to further my education and love of flowers and attended a W.E.A. class at the University of Adelaide given by Betty Byrne. It was a twelve month introduction of four terms - Summer, Autumn, Winter and Spring. I really did enjoy the challenge and at the end of the term, Mrs Byrne suggested I should continue in this field and join the South Australian Floral Art Club. The following year after being nominated by her to join. I began a long association with this particular Club. We met once a month and progressed from Learners Division to Open, during which time I entered shows, winning prizes including the Royal Show exhibits. It was there discovered wire-work was were my talents lie. Wedding bouquets and shoulder sprays proved enjoyable I knew I wanted to do more. I encouraged my husband, Don, to grow orchids in the late 1960s by presenting him with the first plant. We now have over 5,000 cymbidiums and also paphiopedilums - my favourites - along with cattleyas, in a cold glasshouse.

It was then I took weekly night classes to learn more about wirework. I did this for about two years and the more experience I had the more confident I became. I enjoy using all flowers but orchids most of all. All types have a charm and place of their own and can be adapted to use anywhere.

Late in the 1970s for over period of ten years, I did some teaching which I really enjoyed. This particular class developed a special bond. It was therapeutic and a great social outlet for all and we gained much from it. Some fingers did not work too well but everyone helped one another. I gave up that class two years ago and I no longer belong to the S.A. Floral Art Club. As I still have a family at home and work each day and have my own orchids to look after, I find one meeting a month with the Orchid Club is sufficient.

Early in the 1970s I was approached to do the flowers for a Wedding. I have since arranged flowers for many Weddings and this has proved to be very fulfilling and given me great pleasure. Every Wedding is different and the bouquets and arrangements are designed for each individual bride and my own special love goes into every wedding.

THUNIA Ed.

An interesting and ,to me, unusual orchid at the December Cultural Meeting was Thunia alba grown by Don Biebrick.

I had actually driven to the meeting next to and then behind Don and the white flowers I could

see bobbing up and down in the back of his car really had me guessing. I had thought that maybe it was a white tiger lily or even a gladioli that Don was putting in as a raffle prize. But no it was Thunia alba.

The native habitat of this species is Southeast Asia, India and China.

Thunias are sympodial i.e. have a rhizone that grows horizontal, like the cattleyas and laelias etc, they're terrestrial and will form clumps of erect stems up to 50 inches high.

Don grows his plant out with the cymbidiums. It is in fine bark, watered up to twice a week this time of the year, and fertilized with very weak fertilizer. Don puts a little blood and bone around the top of the pot.

The plant at the meeting had 5 lovely white flowers but some of the genus can have up to 12 blooms. Maybe next time we see this one the flower count will have increased too.

Maybe I wont mistake it for a gladdy or tiger lily either.

PLANT NAMES

DECEMBER 1991 FLOWER OF THE MONTH ENCYCLIA RAIATEA grown by Betty Wyly

The plant of 7 shiny ovoid pseudobulbs was growing in an 18cm. pot in bark and isolite, and carried 2 tall branching inflorescences of purplish brown flowers 27 and 28 respectively.

This hybrid was registered in 1953 and is a crossing of Enc. selligera and cordigera, two species from Mexico, Central America and Columbia.

Encyclias grow with a minimum night temperature of 10c. When in active growth give plenty of water and humidity. They seem to like moderate shade, and grow quite happily given the same culture as cattleyas. Keep on the dry side once the new growth matures.
