Two layers of shade cloth are used, and tree ferns were grown close by to provide a good atmosphere.

Medium size pastel sunset shades from compact growing plants. Strong tall stems and heavy texture. Cool growers.

HAVE YOU A PROBLEM ?

The following Questions and Answers have been supplied by SYD MONKHOUSE, from ADELAIDE ORCHIDS Pty. Ltd., Briadale Road O'HALLORAN HILL.

- Question 1. : DO I NEED A GLASSHOUSE TO GROW CYMBIDIUMS ?

 Definitely not. A glasshouse is too hot during summer. Cymbidiums love outside conditions with plenty of sun, water and air movement. They are ideally suited in a lightly shaded position where they get at least two-thirds full sun for all the day, especially during the summer. The ideal is a 'Sarlon' shadehouse made from 50% to 70% Sarlon Shade Cloth, but a lightly leafed tree, such as an old almond tree, will give very good conditions. They will not grow continuously in a sunroom or an enclosed verandah, as is far too dark and too hot during summer. They can be taken into a sunroom whilst they are in flower- which is for 6-8 weeks.
- Question 2.: WHY WON'T MY CYMBIDIUMS FLOWER?

 You have most likely been growing them in too shady position.

 Cymbidiums are sun-lovers. Shift them to a position as described in question 1.
- Question 3.: CAN CYMBIDIUMS BE GROWN IN THE GROUND ?

 No! They require a light open potting medium. Cymbidiums must have good drainage.
- Question 4.: WHY DO YOU USE PLASTIC POTS ?
 Because of five reasons:-
 - [a] Plastic pots are light to handle.
 - [b] They remain damper longer than terra-cotta ones and thus require less watering.
 - [c] They keep cleaner and look better.
 - [d] they do not cause salt build-up in the compost.
 - [e] They keep the compost warmer and thus lengthen out the growing season.
- Question 5.: HOW LONG DOES IT TAKE FOR A BACKBULB TO FLOWER ?

 As a rule they take 3-4 years to develop into a flowering size plant
- Question 6.: DOES DIVIDING A PLANT STOP IT FROM FLOWERING NEXT SEASON?

 No. As long as several flowering sized divisions are kept and the dividing is done before November, given the right conditions, they should flower the next season.
- Question 7.: CAN I PLANT A SMALL PLANT INTO A BIG POT TO SAVE DISTURBING IT?

 It is unwise to overpot. Pot into a container with enough room
 for about two years growth. Overpotted orchids do not grow as
 well as correctly potted ones and it also wastes compost.
- Question 8. : IS IT NECESSARY TO FEED CYMBIDIUMS ? Yes it is wise to feed regularly.
