PROPOGATION of CYMBIDIUMS

Wouldn't we all like one of our own seedlings to be a Grand Champion. Last meeting Peter Chiles, who has a nursery at Gawler, told us about his interest in hybridizing. He brought along some flasks at various stages, from a 'mother' flask to replates and one which was ready to be deflasked.

Cymbidiums can be propagated in three ways:-

1. Division of plants.

2. Seedlings-

Selected plants are pollinated then the resulting seed pod develops. Seed pods take approximately 6-7 months to ripen and may contain anything up to 1 million seeds or may be completely infertile and contain no seed at all. After the pods are picked they are thoroughly cleansed, the seed removed and placed, under sterile conditions, into a mother flask which contains agar to nourish the young growing plantlets. Peter adds banana pulp to this from which he has been getting good results. Seed generally germinates within two months.

3. Meristem tissue culture-

A small piece of the growth eye from a new lead is cut out under sterile conditions and put into a mother flask and from there eventually thinned out and reflasked.

Deflasking:-

If the plants cannot be removed undamaged break the flask and carefully separate the plants. Peter plants out these seedlings into six inch community pots of 15 plants containing Tasmanian spag. moss which has been soaked in hot water for 10 mins. to remove any unwanted fern spores. The pots are then covered with a plastic bag and placed outside in a frost free area under double shade cloth. Feed - Top Soluble, Growlush or any inorganic fertilizer half strength. After 2-3 months remove bag. Plant out into single pots after 12-18 months.

Peter passed around a mature seedpod, some flasks for us to examine and showed how like very fine dust cymbidium seed is by sprinkling some in the light of the slide projector. On the slides we saw his lamina flow unit, cymbidiums and a diagrammatic explanation of how to take meristem tissue which made it much easier to understand.

Just as a matter of interest, during final discussion and questions it was pointed out that *Cym. madidum* is one orchid which resents any disturbance, so don't be in a hurry to break up this Australian species, it prefers to grow into a specimen.

Peter kindly donated two flasks of seedlings to the Club, so maybe we'll see some prize winners in the future.

Many thanks Peter.

INCOME TAX

THE SOUTH COAST ORCHID CLUB OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA INC

We refer to your letter of 7 March 1989 seeking exemption from income tax for the abovenamed club.

Based on the information supplied, we consider that the club would qualify for exemption from tax on its income under the provisions of sections 23(g)(ii) of the Income Tax Assessment Act if its constitution is amended. The amendments which we consider necessary are to clauses 29 and 30.

Non-profit Clause (Replacing Clause 29)

"The income and property of the club shall be applied solely towards the promotion of the objects of the club and no portion thereof should be paid or transferred directly or indirectly, by way of dividend bonus or otherwise, howsoever by way of profit to members or relatives of members of the club, providing that nothing herein shall prevent the payment in good faith of remuneration to any officer or servant of the club or to any member of the club in return for any services actually rendered to the club or reasonable and proper rental for premises let by any member to the club."

Winding-up Clause (Amendment to Clause 30)

At the end of the second sentence of Clause 30 add the phrase "and which prohibit the distribution of income and property to members".

Upon receipt of an advice that amendments similar to the above have been made to the club's constitution we shall confirm the club's exemption from income tax. This exemption would then apply indefinitely.

4. Standard cymbid backbulbs must have at least 20cm leaf growth, sound bulb, well rooted and in at least 115mm (4") pot.
5. Mini & Intermediate cymbids must be well rooted, have sound bulbs and be potted in wellpresented pots.
6. At Shows plants preferred to be in spike, otherwise some of the older varieties may be refused to be accepted, this also appliesto 'struck' backbulbs. Prefferredif you supply known named varieties.

EXHIBITORS' RULES - WINTER SHOW

1. All exhibitors must be financial members of the South Coast Orchid Club of South Australia Incorporated.
2. Entries are free.
3. Exhibitors are bound by the Constitution, Rules and By-Laws and Special Show Rules of the Club.
4. The opinion of the Judges is final and binding and no objections or discussion regarding results will be considered with one exception of an infringement by an exhibitor of any of the Club's Laws, By-Laws, or Show Rules. Any objection in this case must be lodged with the Club Show Marshall.
5. The Club accepts no responsibility for any loss, damage or infection suffered by any plant or blooms exhibited.
6. The Club reserves the right to photograph any of the exhibit if it should so wish.
7. In all matters regarding the arrangement and conducting of the Show, with the exception of matters pertaining to the judging, the Show Marshall is the ruling authority.
8. No plant suspected by the Club's 'Virus Adjudicators' of being infected with virus will be eligible for competition and such plant(s) will be completely isolated from all other plants.
9. The exhibition area will be closed during judging. No exhibitors, public or member other than the Show Marshall, Registrar of Judges, Judges and Associate Judges of the Club and other person so appointed as to assist with the judging will be allowed to remain in the exhibition area during this period.
10. Non-exhibitors are requested not to congregate in the exhibition area prior to judging so that Officials can arrange plants and perform other necessary duties unhindered.
11. Plants must be labelled with the colored labels provided by the Club with exhibitor's number and name of plant. Supply of these labels can be obtained from the Show Marshall or his nominee.
12. Exhibitors are to ensure that that all labelling be neatly and correctly performed in accordance with the procedure laid down on Orchid Nomenclature and Registration. Labelling shall be legible from a reasonable distance.
13. All exhibits must be benched between 6.00pm and 8.30pm.
14. Exhibits must be removed and the Hall cleaned by 5.30pm.
15. Exhibitors unable to remove their own plants from the Show should provide the person doing so with a letter of authorisation.
16. Damage caused in transit to the Show should be reported to the Show Marshall or Registrar of Judges prior to the commencement of judging.
17. If in the opinion of the Judge, a plant not being worthy of an award or prize in any specified section, then none shall be given.

Oncidium papilio is regarded as being a difficult orchid to obtain, and to successfully cultivate. The beautiful specimen displayed by Tony Brady on the 2nd Division bench at the April Cultural Meeting belied this reputation. The plant was small, the tall inflorescence with one large bloom emanating from the third growth. This plant has happily flourishing in its bark compost, on the kitchen windowsill, which proves you don't necessarily need a glasshouse to successfully grow all types of orchids.

Onc. papilio is an epiphytic plant, with one leafed psuedobulbs. The erect inflorescence can be up to 1 mete high, with flowers produced one at a time from the apex. The plant can be in flower for many months.

The flowers are spectacular, up to 10 cms. high. The sepals and petals are yellowish marked with orange orange-brown, the wide lip is yellow marked orange-brown, the callus pale yellow or white marked with orange-brown spots, the petals and dorsal sepal are long and then the lateral sepals much broader.

Onc. papilio is commonly called the "Butterfly Orchid". It is closely elated to *Onc.kamerianum* differing in the peduncle, *Onc. limminghei* resembles a miniature *Onc. papilio*, with red-brown sepals and petals marked with orange-brown.

The genus *Oncidium* is a large group of about 750 species, found in the whole of Central America from Mexico to Brazil. The species *Onc. papilio* is wide spreading the lower montane forests of Trinidad, Venezuela, Colombia, Ecuador and Peru. It was first introduced into cultivation in 1824. There are several varieties;Var. majus, from Trinidad being most spectacular with flowers much larger than type and more richly coloured.

Oncidiums are closely related to *Odontoglossums*, *Miltonias* and *Brassias* with which they have been extensively hybridized.

They require much the same growing conditions as *Odontoglossums*, an abundance of water and frequent fertilizing during the growing period, and a sweet fresh atmosphere. They also need a rest period after flowering.

A Second Division Exhibitor shall mean an exhibitor who has nominated for this division. A member may not exhibit in this division after they have won 20 major prizes.

Clause 1. B. 4

A First Division Exhibitor shall mean an exhibitor who has nominated for this division or who has graduated from the Second Division and is not an Open Division Exhibitor. A member may not exhibit in this division after he has won 30 major prizes, in this Division in the Preceding 3 years, subject to clause 2 (a) hereof.

1. Best of Division at any Cultural Meeting.
2. Any First Prize at any Show (Autumn, Winter, Spring).
3. First placing in any yearly aggregate section in a show year.

THIS MONTH'S RECIPE

DATE AND WALNUT CAKE.

8 oz. self raising flour
4 oz. margarine or cooking fat
2 oz. walnuts 6 oz. stoned dates
approximatley 5 tablespoons of milk.

4 oz. sugar.
1 egg.

to decorate: walnut halves and dates.

Seive the flour, rub in the margarine or cooking fat; add the sugar, chopped walnuts and dates, egg and milk to bind.
Press the walnut halves and dates on top, then bake in a moderate oven for approximatley 1-1 1/2 hours. Allow to cool then cut into 12 portions.
