DISA GROWERS

Have you repotted your Disas yet? Please remember they should be very carefully repotted in spagnum moss and polystyrene when the new plants are about 50mm high. When the plants are actively growing a very weak liquid fertiliser may be applied.

ZYGOPE TALUMS

At this time of the year, and for the next few months, we see a number of Zygopetalums on our show bench. One of the questions in a recent Student Judges' Assignment was:

You are presented with two Zygopetalums, Z. intermedium and Z. mackaii. Write down the differences between the two species.

Simple enough you say, just look at Sanders or whatever reference book on species that you have. Well it's not quite that simple. My research showed the following.

Z. intermedium and Z.mackaii (Z. mackayi) are often confused by growers and judges alike, but when the authors of books and articles on zygopetalums can't agree it's easy to see why.

Northen in Home Orchid Growing states that :- both have green sepals and petals, blotched with brown, and a broad white lip veined with branching lines of purple. The chief differences are that in intermedium the purple lip lines are actually in rows of downy hairs, while the lip of mackayi is smooth, and the petals of intermedium are about equal to the sepals in length, whilst those of mackayi are shorter.

Rentoul in Growing Orchids states that :- the principal identification lies in the dorsal petal, which on Z. mackayi is slighty longer than the petals, while those of Z. intermedium are all of equal length.

Bechtel, Cribb and Launert in The Manual of Cultivated Orchid Species states that :- Z. intermedium is distinguished from Z. mackaii by its downy lip and lastly

Sanders makes no mention of differing length of petals although he does state that Z. intermedium has a bi-lobed lip which he doesn't refer to with Z. mackayi. Sanders does however mention Z. mackayi var. intermedium that he suggests has large flowers, lip more expanded and a paler color.

To sum up I **THINK** the concensus is :-

if the length of the dorsal and petals are the same the flower you are looking at is Z. intermedium, however, if the petals are shorter than the dorsal the flower is Z. mackayi, and probably the other difference is that Z. intermedium has a downy lip.



CIRRHOPETALUM

Early last year we purchased plant of Cirrhopetalum rothschildianum. "However do you pronounce that first name genus", you might well ask. It's quite simple, if I wrote it as see-row-pet-a-lum it would make it easy.

We had seen a plant with a name like that at an Autumn Show and it looked quite weird - in fact nothing like any orchid we'd ever seen. The head of 'flowers' were almost like an open umbrella with each spoke being a dark, blotchy, wine colored flower with almost a little face and arms at the end closest to the handle (stem).

On getting our latest 'baby' home from the nursery we thought we'd better do some study and read as much as possible about its requirements, which is what we should have done before we purchased it of course. in discovered that publications <u>Cirrhopetalums</u> were described as such, whilst others they are under the heading Bulbophyllums.

did find a picture and description, however, in the Manual of Cultivated Orchids by Bechtel, Cribb and Launert.

In general Cirrhopetalums are native to India, South East Asia, Indonesia, New Guinea, Africa and Pacific Islands. They are small to medium size plants whose pseudobulbs are spaced along creeping rhizones. The single leaf grows from the top of the pseudobulb. The inflorescence is usually erect and forms from the base of the pseudobulb.

Because of the creeping growth habit these plants are best grown in shallow pots or baskets. They require plenty of water during their growing season but less when pseudobulbs are fully formed. In summer they seem to need plenty of humidity. Ours are planted in shallow pots in fine pine bark to which polystryrene has been added, and live in the glasshouse.

As you may have guessed from the previous comment we now have several plants of this genus, one has flowered, 2 have been repotted, and 2 more need it. (Due to the rapid growth across the pot).

We hope to flower all these little gems this year or next, maybe you would like to try Cirrhopetalums in your collection.

GRAND CHAMPION: C. PORTIA 'MONTY' GROWN BY KEITH.H. NORTHCOTE Cattleya Portia was made by Veitch as long ago as 1892 and flowered in 1897. It is one of the parents of C. Portiata the Reserve Champion.

RESERVE CHAMPION: C. PORTIATA 'MEL' GROWN BY DALE & BILL COOK Cattleya Portiata is a hybrid between C. Portia and the species C. labiata.
