This group of orchids are cool growing and produce their sprays of large, colorful flowers throughout the year, when they will last in perfection for eight to ten weeks.

The intergeneric hybrids are produced as follows:-

Odontoglossum x Oncidium

= ODONTOCIDIUM

Odontoglossum x Cochlioda

= ODONTIODA

Odontoglossum x Miltonia

= ODONTONIA

Odontoglossum x Miltonia x Cochlioda Odontoglossum x Oncidium x Cochlioda

= VUYLSTEKEARA

= WILSONARA

The above represent some of the more well known genera.

WINTER SHOW

This will enble the Show Committee to determine bench space and to provide for protective fencing. Plant labels will be available at the July meeting It is in members interests that all plants exhibited be marked with the exhibitors number on the pot in such a way that it will not rub off.

HELPFUL HINTS

Cymbidium buds are now beginning to emerge and should diseases and pests be in evidence, then use dusting powders. A sprinkle of Disyston 5 will protect your flowering plants from aphids and thrips. When you put your spiking cymbidiums under shelter, give some thought to the amount of light each plant will require, as this is important. Basically, it is strong light for strong colours, and less light for the more pastel cloours.

Now is the time to water paphiopedilums sparingly, and if possible, avoid overhead watering. Be sure to stake stems straight up, consequently when the buds open, the presentation is correct. Cattleyas are now beginning their rest period - very light watering and no fertilizing. Likewise soft-cane dendrobiums.

TOPIC FOR MEETING

Demonstration Modern arrangement

For work in class bring container and material suitable for a modern arrangement. Do not forget a good pin point, this is most essential. Background material can be either dry or fresh and a few graded flowers. Decide what line you are going to do and bring material to suit. e.g. Crescent - curved material; horizontal or diagonal etc - straight material. If you have any questions from last months notes bring them along to be answered at the June meeting.

Following on from last months notes with our thoughts on the Winter Show, let us look at "A Modern Arrangement."

First and foremost a modern arrangement must be in a modern container which means not an old-fashioned urn or vase etc. It should have a good clean line, which has not been cluttered with unnecessary material. An arrangement which is bold in design, which means interesting or unusual voids and which are used to their best advantage - strong contrast in color and form. The focal point is very important - see that it is well placed, eyecatching and dominant. Be sure that your container and arrangement compliment one another - that they can be viewed as a whole and not as two parts - this can usually be achieved by bringing a leaf or some other piece of material from the arrangement cown over the lip of the container.
