Sue 'Waitohu' x Olymilum 'White Elf' 4N

Expectation are for white or blush pink; perhaps more in the pastel pink shades. May/June bloomers with fabulous production.

Doreen Rosman 'Featherhill' x Mary Pinchess 'Shamrock'

Good yellow intermediates. The cross is a sure bet for bright colour, good shape & strong spike habit. August/September flowering.

Radiant Harry 'Fourex' x Dolly 'Featherhill' 4N

The superb deep pink Radiant 'harry' with its solid lip is sure to give good results. Expect Mini Radiant Harry's.

Last Chance 'Pink Puff' x Ruby Eye's Red Baron 4N

The first have flowered from this cross with exciting potential showing up. Bright pink and shapely for June/July.

Rincon 'Clarisse' 2N x Ivy Fung 'Ironstone'

This cross will give unusual shades of peach, orange or polychrome yellow-red pink shades. Full shapely blooms.

<u>Mighty Mouse 'Minnie' x Chironla 'Tabasco'</u>

Carrying on the Mighty Mouse theme these will have eye stopping rich oranges with black lips. Neat growers.

Showgirl 'Audrey Hepburn' x Rod Stewart 'Yowie Bay'

Nice and white with parishii influence from Rod Stewart expect sparkling white with pretty heavily spotted lips.

Dr Baker 'Bewitched' 4N x Trophie Night

Very deep reds with dark velvety lips. Small growers that will mature quickly.

ON THE BENCH

On the First Division Bench this month there were two beautiful specimen plants of Cattleya Valentine Day. Both plants were very large, with multiple flowering growths. One plant, benched by Chas Amee had the regulation minimum of 8 flowers per cane and was judged best in the Novelty Cluster Cattleya Section. The other plant benched by Mr & Mrs Van Leuveren had 7 flowers on each cane and was judged best in the Novelty Cattleya Section and eventually best in First Division, and Registrar's Choice for February.

Both plants had clean fresh flowers, similar in colour. Deep purple overlaid with brown, with a very high gloss.

- C. Valentine Day is a recent, exceptionally successful crossing of C. Chocolate Drop x C. Intermediate. C. Chocolate Drop came from a crossing of the tall growing, brown species C. guttala, and the brilliant orange-red species C. aurantraca. C. Chocolate Drop carries up to 20, very dark brown shiny flowers on very tall canes, the latter being a characteristic of C. guttala,, and the number of flowers inherited from both species.
- C. Intermediate is a rather complex hybrid with 6 separate species in its parentage, all of which are rose on lilac coloured. C. Intermediate has large pink flowers, and crossed with the dark brown C. Chocolate Drop has produced some striking colour combinations. Most are in the

deep purple-maroon shades with a brown overlay, and all displaying a beautiful gloss. An exception has been a plant with flowers orange-coloured, with a purple overlay.

The plants seen to date all have tall flowering canes, with multiple flowering spikes they grow quickly and flower freely, certainly most desirable traits.

C. Valentine Day is an orchid well worth adding to the collection, and will grow quite well in an unheated glasshouse.

MINATURE CATTLEYAS by Rob Warden cont. from December '89 gazette

Another exciting yellow mini is Blc. Waikiki Gold a cross of Blc. Pink Surprise x C.forbesii. This parent is being used by Hawaian hybridisers such as J. Woltman (a well known mini breeder), Miyamoto Orchids, and Richard Takafugii of The Orchid Centre. Size dominant, even when crossed with Standards such as Blc. Mem. Helen Brown. Usually the yellow colour dominates, except when crossed with Bro.sanginea to form the intergeneric Otaara, where often a muddy bronze-red results. Well known hybrids include the yellow with white flare Blc. Kyle and the yellow Blc. Golden Delicious.

The most exciting minature hybrid in my opinion is Slc. Tangerine Jewel (Slc. Beamche x Soph.coccinea). Registered only in 1978, has been used extensively in Hawaii, producing small flowers, usually in the red-orange colours. Notables include: x C.luteola produced Slc. Tangerine Imp (yellow/orange), already awarded in U.S.A.. x L.pumila, produced Slc. Pink Doll (openish pink/lavender) grows and blooms well.

x Sl. Psyche produced Slc. Red Delite (small reds). Hybrids of potential not already mentioned include Slc. Madge Fordyce, Lc. Mini Purple, C. Penny Kuroda.

Hybrids using the following species with dominant features that could be expected.

- Soph.coccinea: usually only 1 2 flowers, mostly red but there is a yellow form. Imparts cold tolerance. Dislikes extreme heat. Some older hybrids are being remade with a (4N) tetraploid S.coccinea. Flowers of these are keenly awaited.
- L.pumila: imparts vivid purple colour, usually the flower count is low, good shape. Notably: L.C. Mini Purple (L.pumila x C.walkerama) produced in 1965.
- L.briegeri: being used in preference to L.flava dominant flower size and form. Yellow usually dominant. Notably: L.briegeri x Slc. California Apricot, champion seedling at A.P.O.C.III Adelaide '89. It had 3 smallish yellow flowers a red lip & flares at petal tips.
- C.luteola: as mentioned earlier usually dominant in colour, size and shape. Notably: Hybrid Sc. Beaufort (S.coccinea x C.luteola.)
- C.aclandiae: breeds easily, sometimes produces spots in 2nd gen. Hybrids include Slc. Precious Stones, Slc. Dixie Jewels.
- C.intermedia "aquinii": Another species of importance. Of prime influence in splash cattleyas both Standard and Minature. Notable early mini. hybrid now being remade, possibly with superior parents is Slc. Batemanniana (Soph.coccinea x C.intermedia) compact in size, white with red flares. Blc. Horizon Flight (C.intermedia x Blc. Buttercup) yellow with red flare or splashes about 75-80mm in size. Main fault of C.intermedia is sepals and petals roll forward over the lip and this poor property is often passed on usually in the first generation hybrids.
- C.aurantiacai: imparts yellow colour, small size and increased flower count.
- Bro.sanguinea: a native of Jamaica has been responsible for the intergeneric Hawkinsara (Bro. x Slc.), Otaara (Bro. x Blc.) but hybrids may require a little warmth. To date the red colour is dominant resulting even in muddy brown-reds. But there are alba forms of Bro.sanguinea and selfings are flowering true white, so I see a new colour range of intergenerics using Bro.sanguinea "alba".

I hope some of you will be tempted to try these easily grown, richly rewarding, intensely coloured, small plants.
