
Plants will be judged before being put in displays

STAKING AND TIEING OF CYMBIDIUMS

Although the basic rules for staking, tieing and supporting Cymbidiums has not changed there will be some relaxation in the way they are applied by the South Australian Judges.

Cymbidiums with more than one tie or support beyond the first flower will not be disqualified but judges will be assessing the ability of the stem to support the flower by removing all but one tie.

Please be aware that if you accidently, or deliberately, present a plant with additional ties or supports, all but one can be removed. Although all care will be taken, neither the judges nor the Club will be responsible for any damage that may result.

THIS IS YOUR (ORCHID) LIFE MERVYN STEELE As told to Helen

Question: How long have you been growing orchids Mery?

Answer: Too long. Since about 1977 Question: What genera do you grow?

Answer: Mainly cyms with a few other odds

and ends.

Question: What do you call odds and ends?

Answer: Natives, cattleyas, a few cattleytonias, and odontoglossum alliance.

Question: What do you do with the flowers.

Answer: We sell them, we have a good market for the flowers, have had for a number of years

Question: What sort of potting mix do you use?

Answer: Mainly bark with some seashells,

crushed, perhaps some peat.

Question: Do you use the same for all genera? Answer: Yes, but some need a finer mix than others, a different grade of bark. I'm very keen on a coarse mix but the only thing is in Summer, when you get the hot days, you can't keep the water up.

Question: How often do you water in Summer?

Answer: We usually sprinkle down at night

and give them a water every 2 or 3 days depending on the weather. In winter we don't have to water much.

These plants are all under 70% shadecloth.

Question: All of them.

Answer: Yes, the shadehouse is steel or tubing with a hip roof, with sandstone shadecloth on the top with white 50% around the outside.

We've recently put in those roller benches which have proved a great thing for extra room, only need one 2'6" path in each shadehouse. We've found them very convenient and haven't been jammed in between yet.

Question: What fertilizer do you use?

Answer: A mixture of fertilizers.

Phostrogen from December thru March, then high Nitrogen, Nitrosol, I give them a bit of a mixture.

They all get the same fertilizer.

Question: How often do you fertilize?

Answer: About every fortnight.

Question: What about light?

Answer: This year with our benches going from about 1/2 metre to a metre plus, off the ground they would be getting more light.

Question: Do you think you are going to get a better flowering this year?

Answer: So far yes, but it could just be this season.

Question: How many orchid clubs do you belong to Mery?

Answer: Three this year, Murray Bridge, O.C.S.A and South Coast.

Question. Is your wife, Shirley, interested in orchids too?

Answer: Yes, its a partnership, we work as a team, and always have done.

Question: How many years have you been married to Shirley, Merv?

Answer: 49 years.

Question: What is your favourite flower?

Answer: I like the cymbidiums, I've got a few favourites that I don't like parting with.

U.K. NEWS

Another interesting item that crossed my 'desk' from Nature Watch by Willy Newlands courtesy of Pam & John Beasley.

Just to prove that a group of 'Conservationists' can make a difference.

For the last 50 years England has had only one species of Lady's Slipper, Cypripedium calceolus, growing in the wild, in a semi-shaded area, on a secret site.

However, experts, funded by the Sainsbury
Orchid Conservation Project, have now
managed to germinate seeds from this lone
orchid and introduce them back into the

wild in Yorkshire.

The plants are now near flowering size.

Wonder how long it will be before they are in 'someone's' collection or am I a pessimist? Ed.

SARCOCHILUS (the ch is pronounced as a c)

Be very careful when applying poison for slugs and/or snails near your sarcs. Apparently these little gems can suffer severe damage from the metaldehyde dust that is used in some of the snail baits.

COCHLEANTHES amazonica

Whilst reading a price list from a certain orchid nursery recently I came across this species. Thought I'd better do a bit of research as the flower looked rather 'nice' in the picture..

Cochleanthes amazonica is a native of the Amazon area in Brazil, Peru, Ecuador and Colombia. The 7 centimeter white flowers are the largest in the genus. The disc of the lip has blue vein-like lines.

Each inflorescence produces only one flower that comes from the axil of the leaf-sheath.

I'm told they will grow in Adelaide providing the plant is not allowed to dry out completely.

We'll see.

JUNE MONTHLY FLORAL COMPETITION

Laelia anceps

Flower of the Month of June was a pot/basket full of the the showy Laelia anceps grown by Gerald and Mina Voskamp.

This species is a native of Mexico where it is also the most common species.

The reasonably long racemes usually produce about 3 pale rose/purple long lasting flowers in May. *anceps* is considered a cool grower in SA and most people seem to be able to grow it in similar conditions to the cymbidiums although a dry, cool dormant period is perferred.

Our own experience is that it still can be temperamental. Some years ago we moved our non-flowering plant about 3 metres (away from a fence) and it now flowers every year. Ed Congratulations Mina and Gerald.
