

The other night at the Orchid Club of S.A.'s meeting one of our members had an attractive 'cattleya' type flower seeking it's identification, and it was not until Syd Monkhouse was approached that the name Schomlungkia came as the name for the genus.

Schomlungkia is a small genus of epiphytic orchids, endemic to Tropical America, very closely allied to the Laelia, it was established in 1838 by Lindley and named after Sir Robert Schomburg the German botanist who travelled frequently to Guiana and other regions of Tropical Amemerica where the Schomlungkia were to be found.

Schomlungkia are a strong growing orchid that can be grown with cattleyas as both like similar compost and treatment. however there are two distinct sections within the genus.

One Laelia-like in habit, usually having two leaves to each bulb, the bulbs are slender each end and swollen in the middle having long spikes with rather large narrow segmented flowers.

The other section, classified as Myrmecophilas, has cylinderical bulbs with three or four short thick leathery leaves from the apex the long spikes are often branched the flowers have short bracts and are more round.

Cultivation of the latter section differs from the former as more attention to the watering is necessary, water should only be applied whilst the roots are active, but after growth a long dry rest period with full exposure to light is required.

Today most regard the Schomlungkia as Laelia, however in "Sander's Orchid Guide, 1927 Edition" there is an excellent article, this also gives the lists of plants that represents the two sections. Some of the nurseries in their recent catologues list plants of Schomlungkia so why not try one or two with your cattleyas?

AUSTRALIAN EPIPHYTIC ORCHIDS The Month of April:-

The weather should start to cool down this month. Remove any extra shading you placed over the shade house earlier in the year as soon as you feel the hottest weather has passed. DO NOT FERTILIZE YOUR DENDROBIUMS ANY MORE AFTER THIS MONTH UNTIL SPRING, This is the time of the year when growths are maturing and flower buds are being initiated. As the growths mature reduce the watering gradually, this does not mean cut out watering altogether, but just keep the compost nicely moist.

CATTLEYA CULTURE FOR APRIL

Quite a number of later cluster cattleyas are in bud, many decide to turn downward or move into awkward positions, staking at this stage is very beneficial to keep them upright.

Exhibition cattleyas are nearly all in sheath or in bud, occassionally mealy bug finds a comfortable home near the base of the sheath or flower stem. SPRAYS AT THIS TIME WILL DAMAGE THE FLOWERS, SO USE A DUST. Malathion will control them and other pests, but again KEEP THE DUST AWAY FROM THE BUDS.

Watering, as nights get cooler less water is required particularly those in the glasshouse without artificial heat. <u>Do not let them dry out at this time</u> but once a week watering is sufficient. If the compost is heavy, or with smaller particles of material, they hold the water so even 10 days apart watering will suffice.

Where heat is used this will dry the plants so twice a week watering may be needed Once a fortnight add a small amount of fertilizer.

MONTHLY CALENDAR for CYMBIDIUMS

Month of April:-

Watch for those spikes they are very brittle,

Some growers recommend a lime rinse through the pots, to bring the compost back to a neutral Ph.

Foliar spray with a more even NPK ratio fertilizer, such as Nitrosol, Fish Emulsion etc., this could be the last month that you may be able to foliar spray as the spikes should be lengthening and even some could have buds out of the sheath.

Be on the lookout for spikes that need staking, only stake in the warmer part of the day when the spikes are pliable otherwise it could be disastrous and you

of the day when the spikes are pliable otherwise it could be disastrous and you could finish up with your precious spike in your hand.

Continue to repot seedlings as required, give them a chance to settle down before the cold weather set in and their growing cycle slows down, also it still is not too late to break mature plants. but be carefull not those in spike.

There are approximately 20 species of Miltonia, several natural hybrids and numerous man-made hybrids. They are epiphytic, occasionally lithophytic, natives of Tropical and Sub-tropical America, distributed from Costa-Rica and Panama, through the Andes to Brazil, in Colombia and Ecuador.

The genus is a member of the sub-tribe Oncidiinae, closely allied to Odontoglossums, and consists of two groups; those from high elevations, sometimes called 'Pansy Orchids' for their large viola shaped flowers, and those from Brazil which are warmer growing species.

The flowers of the Brazilian species are usually green or yellow, barred or marked with brown, purple or magenta. Those from the Andes Regions are usually white or pink, with markings of crimson or magenta. In general Miltonias bear prominent pseudobulbs and thin textured leaves, the flowers are borne singly or multiferous racemes from the base of the most recently formed pseudobulbs. The genus Miltonia has been extensively hybridized with others of the sub-tribe Oncidinae, and now beautiful hybrids with the Oncidium, Odontoglossum, Cochlioda, Brassia, Aspasia and Trichopilia species can be obtained.

Two different stes of cultural conditions are required for Miltonias:Those from high elevations should be grown in shade with constantly moist
and cool conditions. Plants should be repotted frequently to keep the compost
fresh, as the roots will not tolerate stale compost.

The species from Brazil and other warmer areas do well treated like Oncidiums they can be grown in pots and baskets, or on tree-fern slabs.

Miltonia Leucoglossa exhibited by Adelaide Orchids, was the Registrar's choice at the March Cultural meeting, the well grown plant consisted of about a dozen pseudobulbs, and bore five spikes carrying a total of 14 flat, rounded 2"-3" rose-purple flowers.

Miltonia Leucoglossa is a natural hybrid between Miltonia spectalilis and Miltonia candida. It comes from Brazil and is autumn flowering. Miltonia spectalilis bears one or two large flat flowers, sepals and petals creamy white, rose-flushed at their bases the lip is broad, rose-pink with deeper veinings, with a pale rose or whitish margin. Miltonia spectalilis van Moneliana has rather larger flowers of a deep rich purple colour, the lip veined with rose.

Miltonia candida bears 5 or 6 large flowers 3" or more across, sepals and petals chestnut brown tipped and marked with yellow, the lip is white with two purplish blotches on the disc.

It is apparent that Miltonia Leucoglossa on the bench, was a natural hybrid between Miltonia candida and Miltonia spectabilis var Moreliana, Miltonia candida giving the multiflowering habit and Miltonia spectabilis var Moreliana the beautiful rose-purple colour.

The plant is grown in a fir-bark and isolite compost, and given conditions as for Odontoglossums.

A truly beautifulorchid.
