THIS MONTH'S PROFILE :-

Malcolm Mangelsdorf and his wife Lyn are the proprietor's of Noarlunga Orchids, their business is in the cut flower and pot plant trade, Malcolm was one of the pioneer's in Australia of the Orchid gift boxes . He traveled overseas looking into the cut flower trade, and picked up a contract for cut flowers from the United Flower Wholesalers in New York. But had to let the contract lapse becuase he could not get the flowers from other growers to help fill the orders. Malcolm has been asked to share his expertise to other companies by Government Trade Departments. At the Nursery Malcolm is also involved in growing Cyms, Soft Cane Dens, and Cattleyas. He does his own tissue and seedling work. Malcolm has been growing Orchids for 15 years, and Commercial for 7years. Malcolm does not believe Commercial growers should compete against amateur growers in competitions, as he believes commercial growers have an edge over the rest of us.

Malcolm was the Club's President for 3 years and is a senior officer in the Fire Service. He has also been a life saver and he played Rugby Union with the Brighton Rugby Club for 30 years, for which they made him a Life Member. One thing about visiting Noarlunga Orchids, you will always get a cup of tea or coffee, and Malcolm and Lyn will always share their Orchid knowledge with you.

SPRING SHOW 19th - 24th SEPTEMBER 1988

SETTING UP SATURDAY 17th SEPTEMBER

All displays are to be arranged on Saturday 19th September and are to remain in position until the following Saturday when members are expected to remove plants as from 1pm. Prior to 1pm and after 12.30pm all exhibitors are expected to assist in the dismantling of fencing and placing them in the loading bay. All areas are to be left clean and tidy.

NO PLANTS IN FLOWER OTHER THAN ORCHIDS MAY BE EXHIBITED--THIS INCLUDES ANTHURIUMS.

1. All exhibitors must financial of The South Coast Orchid Club of South Australia Inc, for the period of at least ONE month prior to showing.
2. Entries are free.
3. Exhibitors are bound by the Constitution, Rules and By-Laws and Special Show Rules of the club.
4. The opinion of the Judges is final and binding, and no objections or discussion regarding results will be considered with the exception of an infringement by an exhibitor of any of the Club's Laws, By-Laws or Show Rules. Any objection in this case must lodged with the Club Show Secretary.
5. The Club accepts no responsibility for any loss, damage or infection suffered by any plants or blooms exhibited.
6. The Club Reserves the right to photograph any of the exhibits if it should so wish.
7. In all matters regarding the arrangement and conducting of show (with the exception of judging) the Show/Marshall/Secretary is the ruling authority.
8. No plants suspected by the Club Virus Adjudicators of being infected with virus will be eligible for competition and such plants will be completely isolated from all other plants.
9. The exhibition areas will be closed during the judging. No exhibitors, public or members other than Show Marshall/Secretary, Judges of the club and Associate Judges and other persons appointed to assist in judging will be allowed to remain in the exhibition area during this period.
10. Non-exhibitors are requested not to congregate in the exhibition area prior to judging so that officials can arrange plants and perform other necessary duties unhindered.
11. Plants must labelled with the correct coloured labels available from the club with the exhibitors number and name of plant. Supply of these labels can be obtained from the Show Marshall/Secretary or his nominee.
12. Exhibitors are to ensure that the labelling be neatly, and correctly performed in accordance with the procedure laid down on Orchid Nomenclature and Registration.
13. All exhibits must be arranged on the afternoon of Saturday September .
- 14 Exhibits must not be removed before 12.30P.M. on Saturday
15. Exhibitors unable to remove their own plants from the show should provide the person so doing with a letter of authorisation.
16. Damage caused in transit to the show should be reported to the Show Marshall/Secretary or Registrar of Judges prior to judging.
17. If in the opinion of the judges, a plant exhibited is not worthy of an award or prize in any specified section, then none shall be given.

CONTROL OF BULB ROT IN ORCHIDS

Several fungi can cause bulb rot or black rot in orchids, the main ones belonging to the groups Pythium and Phytophthora. These are related soil inhabiting diseases which can be difficult to control, particularly when conditions are warm and moist. Thus bulb rot are most prevalent under conditions of high rainfall or over-watering during October to December and also during the autumn period, especially when earlier fungicide treatment has not been carried out.

The fungi which cause bulb rot are very common and can be introduced in contaminated potting soil in irrigation water from polluted dams. Unlike some other diseases, these fungi are not readily spread through the air but depend more on rain splash or mechanical means to spread spores.

Orchid plants can live in harmony with these diseases when conditions are relatively cool and dry. However when higher temperatures occur in combination with excess watering the disease symptoms rapidly develop, particularly if pots are poorly drained and water-logged.

For a number of years protective fungicides were used for control of these diseases but because no suitable curative product was available, high losses were common once a disease breakthrough occurred.

The new fungicide Fongarid which has curative as well as protective properties against Pythium and Phytophthora fungi has enabled orchid growers to achieve a much higher level of bulb rot control. Fongarid is known to have a much greater safety margin on a wide variety of ornamental plant species particularly in the seedling stage and is the product normally recommended for use on ornamentals, including orchids.

People prefer to use the soil drench technique using Fongarid 25WP at a dilution of 1g product in 1 litre of water. This 1 litre of drench mixture will treat the following number of pots depending on pot size:

30 x 80 mm (3") pots
15 x 100 mm (4") pots
6 x 150 mm (6") pots
2 x 200 mm (8" or 1 gallon) pots
1 x 250 mm (10" or 2 gallon) pots

Although plants already showing early symptoms of the disease can be cured, it is far more preferable to apply the chemical as a protective measure at critical times of the year. Thus the soil drench treatment of Fongarid should be carried out in the early spring and repeated 6 to 10 weeks later. These two applications should provide bulb rot control throughout the entire spring/summer period except when weather conditions are exceptionally wet or watering excessive. A further 1 or 2 soil drench treatments may be needed in the later summer to autumn period particularly if conditions favour the disease.

There is also evidence that Fongarid stimulates the growth of some plants independent of disease control which would explain why so many good reports have followed the use of this fungicide, particularly on young plants.

1. Make sure that you use the CORRECT colour label for your division.
2. Use a WATERPROOF pen to print the label, this can be wiped off with meths, so you can reuse your labels. If you require labels see the SHOW SECRETARY(Ray Goodall for 1988)
3. PRINT AS LARGE AS POSSIBLE, where it is an advantage use two labels.
4. Please print the 'genera' in full.

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REGISTRAR'S CHOICE FOR JULY:-

Mclna Pagan Love Song 'Ruby Charles' L & R Moore

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ON THE BENCH

MacIellanara PAGAN LOVE SONG 'RUBY CHARLES' HCC/O.C.S.A, exhibited by L. & R. Moore, Open Division, was Registrar's Choice, Flower of the Month for July. The plant was recently awarded at the O.C.S.A Winter Show.

The plant of three large green bulbs carried one very long, slightly arching inflorescence bearing 13 flowers. The flowers were very large, star-shaped, of a bright yellow blotched on all segments with dark brown. The intergeneric MacIellanara is obtained by crossing an *Odontoglossum* with an *Oncidium* and a *Brassia*. *Mclna. Pagan Love Song* has rather a complex Odm. hybrid background, bred with *Onc. tigrinum*. Then onto *Brs. verrucosa*.

Onc. tigrinum has bright yellow sepals and petals heavily blotched with dark brown, and a bright yellow lip. So it would seem that the *Mclna.* has inherited these characteristics from it.

The large starry shape can be attributed to *Brs. verrucosa*, as can the lip shape. It is noted that the lateral lip margins are recurved, with the apex broadly rounded, as is the case with *Mclna. Pagan Love Song*. Somewhere along the way, most of the Odm. characteristics have been overshadowed by the infusion of the *Onc. tigrinum* and *Brs. verrucosa* into the breeding line.

Mclnas. prefer an open bark mix, and grow quite readily in the shadehouse along with the cymbidiums. They grow rather quickly into large plants, and do not flower till they build up large size bulbs. When fully mature the bulbs are like miniature footballs, and the flower spikes have been known to carry 20 or more flowers.

There have been many awards granted overseas, and this particular plant compares very favourably.

BOOK REVIEW :-
