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It is with pleasure that the Club would like to announce the following members have graduated from Second Division into First Division, The members are John Gay who has won 22 prizes in two years. Mr. & Mrs. C. Hames who have won 24 prizes in 3 years, congratulations to them.

A very eyecatching equitant *Uncidium* Potpourri X Honey Girl, grown by Charlie and Helen Edwards, was the Registrar's Choice for Month of December. This Oncidium was potted in bark, and although still quite small, showing healthy growth, with one attractive inflorescence of bright, clear yellow flowers. The blooms were approximately 2.5 cms across, and were presented on an arching spike.

Equitant oncidiums are a native to the Islands of the Caribbean, and grow on tree trunks, most species receive daily moisture, either rain or dew. These natural conditions mean that these orchids are ideally suited to slab culture. As the plants do not grow to huge size, several plants can be grown on one long cork slab, and if of different colours do make a very attractive display when in flower.

The beautiful coloured and patterned hybrids in cultivation today are largely due to the 30 year long programme initiated by the late W.W. Goodale Moir of Hawaii in the 1950's.

The most important requirement of equitant oncidiums is buoyant, fresh, air movement. They thrive in a humid atmosphere and respond to a frequent but weak application of fertilizer. Misting is essential for mounted plants, as the roots can dry out very quickly. Plants growing in pots need to be watered carefully, as the confined roots tend to rot easily if kept wet.

'Mealy-Bug' and 'Scale' attack the plants, but they can be kept under control by constant checking for signs of infestation and subsequent application of mentholated spirits by cotton wool swab or small brush.

Don't be in a hurry to cut the spike after the first flowering, as equitants oncidiums can produce secondary and sometimes tertiary inflorescences. they therefore can bloom for several months. The longevity of flowering, size, colour and ease of culture make these orchids very desirable additions to collections.

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Catasetums

Distribution - Tropical Central and South America and West Indies; about 50 species.

Catasetum enjoy bright light and respond to heavy feeding and in situations where there is good air circulation. Potting medium should be coarse and well drained. The plants require a period of dormancy whilst maturing the new growth, this means withholding water for a period of four to six weeks so as not to rot the large food and water storage bulbs. Loss of leaves just before flowering should not be alarming, although a well cared plant will generally flower when it still has its leaves. Care should be taken at this maturing side as red spider may attack, so keep a good look out on underside of the leaves for this pest.

This is one genera where plants produce two distinctive flowers, male or female. It is often said that plants that grown in highlight will produce female flowers.

Rossinglossum grande (formerly known as Odontoglossum grande)

Distribution - Guatemala and Mexico: uncommon and found in forests up ti 2700m altitude

Grown in well drained pots, preferring an intermediate type condition. They have no rest period and dislike being kept dry for any period nor do they like being kept wet, however after the growth has fully mature watering should be kept to a minimum.

There were 14 raffle prizes today, thanks to all who donated them and a nice Christmas present to the lucky winners.

Once again a good variety of orchids benched . The popular vote was won by Harry Viney from Keith Northcote and Norm Gitsham - congratulations to all, great to see orchids flowering nearly all the year.

After the meeting all joined in an excellent afternoon tea, shared the Christmas cake, beautiful too, and adjourned until 16th Feb.

Make a new year resolution and join our Day-Time Chapter, it is one resolution you will be glad you made.

Often a novice grower and those who should know better unwittingly offend a grower when visiting another collection and they often wonder why they are never invited a return visit.

There are four rules which one should observe when visiting another persons orchid collection. One should never :-

- 1. Touch plants in a collection, especially the leaves or the flowers. Although you may think your hands to be clean they are not sterile and may transmit disease.
- 2. <u>DO NOT SMOKE</u>, even do not be ask the owner if you may, however if the owner himself is smoking PLEASE ask permission before you do.
- 3. Do not touch and remove plant labels from pots, if you cannot read the label ASK. Also by removing and replacing the label those precious roots can be damaged. But the main reason is that if the label is inadvertently placed in the next pot the grower then is in a quandry, two labels in one pot and none in another.
- 4. Do not carry a handbag or anything in your hand or on your arm through a collection, especially in a glasshouse, room is limited and as you suddenly turn your handbag may swing outwards resulting in damage to flowers and often knocking over and unpotting what could be valuable plant (not to say that a grower will consider all his plants to be more valuable than yours)

So keep these points in mind and you will be considered as an experienced grower and stand a better chance of being welcomed to call again.

Dendrobium Delicatum , *Den. X delicatum* , Den. Specio-kingianum. (D*en. speciosum X Den. kingianum*)

Den. X delicatum is a natural hybrid listed in 1902 as such
Den. Specio-kingianum a man made hybrid was registered in 1892
Den. delicatum since the 'Sander's List of Orchid Hybrids' addendum 1961-1970 is
listed as a species until the 1981-1985 Volume where it tells us that all hybrids
with 'Delicatum' as one parent will be listed under Specio-kingianum in Sander's.

This is all confusing however the plant, whatever the name is, it is still worth growing.

Den. Delicatum makes a delicate show. There are many variations of this hybrid, some have tall canes some have medium sized canes and others have short dumpy canes likewise the flowers vary from crystalline white through to pinks, mainly pastel colours however. Once the plant becomes established and is of specimen proportion it will make a well worth display and deserve a place in any collection.

One would expect a pink flower of larger than normal size with a prettily spotted pink lip on compact growing plants from this particular cross.

Slc. Tangerine Jewel 'Vi' X C. Penny Kuroda 'Spots'

Compact growers which have the capability of flowering twice a year. Medium sized, good substance and of good shape pastel to sunset blooms, many will have deeper flaring on petals as in 'Spots'.
