The Orchid Club of South Australia will be staging its Spring Show in conjunction with the above in the Walter Duncan Hall on the first floor. A number of South Coast members indicated at the June meeting their interest in submitting plants and at the July meeting of this Club a list will be established of members who intend to participate — with orchids and foliage plants. The intention is to form a Committee to arrange the display and all members are welcome to become involved. Arranging will take place on THURSDAY AUGUST 30

VOLUNTEERS TO HELP AT WINTER SHOW TRADING TABLE

Following the small write up on our club library in the June Gazette, a more comprehensive report is printed this month. Having no wish to infringe any copyright there is not attempt to print large extracts from any book but, taking one fairly new publication namely "The International Book of Orchids" by P. Francis Hunt as an example of the very interesting and 'Down to Earth' style of the writing that this author has used it would make any person remotely interested in orchids aware of many and varied plants that could be obtained and cultivated in the South of Australia. For instance you could read of the attempt in England to protect the only two plants of the almost extinct lady's slipper orchid (Cypripedium calceolus) known to be growing in the wild by mounting a 24 hour a day guard on the spot before, during and after the summer period while they bud, flower and die down each year. That is taking conservation to its full stretch.

Mr. Hunt writes that it is proving difficult to explain to many commercial orchid growers that a rigidly controlled and licensed orchid trade now is essential if there are to be any orchids left to trade in by the end of the century. Of course he is writing of native orchid species of some countries.

It is explained also that it is not unscrupulous and unthinking orchid importers are fully responsible for the decline in the variety and numbers of wild orchids. More species are probably lost through forest clearance, the draining of wetlands and pollution by industry and agriculture than by the over-collecting of orchids for commercial or private gain.

The book also tells of the unique species of which there are two in Australia, Cryptanthemis slateri & Rhizanthella gardneri that grow completely underground not even surfacing to flower.

A most interesting chapter on the exhibiting of orchids is also included. Much more could be printed to share my enthusiasm of this very readable orchid book which is also lavishly illustrated in colour. Join the queue to borrow it.

INTERGENERIC HYBRIDS. by F.E. Lswson. Oregon orchid soc. booklet.

In the past few years the amateur has become interested in the new intergeneric hybrids, which are providing a note of novelty and excitement to his collection. The intercrossing of various genera has been carried on for some time by orchid hybridists, and many new intergeneric hybrids are not available. Others have not yet flowered. Some of the objectives of this type of hybridisation are to further basic knowledge of genetics, to breed compact plants (so welcome in the small greenhouse) and to produce new colours, better shaped flowers, and plants that are easily grown. Much of this work has been carried out in Hawaii, but growers in many parts of the world are obtaining interesting results. The whole subject of intergeneric hybrids is highly controversial, since it creates problems in nomeclature and flower judging standards. One of the results of intergeneric hybridisation is greater ease of culture of these hybrids, which adapt themselves to a wider range of temperatures and growing conditions. Experimental intercrosses include : Vandaenopsis (Vanda x Phalaenopsis) : Brassidium (Brassia x Oncidium); Renanthopsis (Renanthera x Phalaenopsis); Epidiacrium (Epidendrum x Diacrium); Dekensara (Brassocattleya x Schomburgkia); Lycasteria (Bifrenaria x Lycaste); Wilsonara (Odon'tioda x oncidium) Iwanagara (Diacattleya x Brassolaeliocattleya); Milpasia (Miltonia x Aspasia) and Lyonare (Laeliocattleya x Schomburgkia). These and other intercrosses represent the foundation for further experiments in hybridisation, and may become parent stock for something entirely new and unique in the orchid world. The following are a few of the intergeneric novelties now available to add charm to that greenhouse of yours; The trigeneric genus Sophrolaeliobrasso known as Lowiara. Epicattleya Orpettii (Cattleya amethystoglossa X Epidendrum O'Brienianum). Diacattleya Chastity (Diacrium bicornutum x Cattleya granulosa) five to six cream coloured flowers with pink

Diacattleya Chastity (Diacrium bicornutum x Cattleya granulosa) five to six cream coloured flowers with pink stripes on lip, and heavy substance. The growth is bifoliate cattleya type, while the star shaped three inch flowers resemble the Diacrium.

Rodricidium Tahiti (Oncidium flexuosum x Rodriguezia secunda) has a monopdial growth habit. Branched sprays carry numerous 1½" vivid red flowers with yellow lip. Blooms several times a year.

Cattleyatonia Rosy Jewel (Broughtonia sanguinea x Cattleya Bowringiana). In a realm of flora already so well endowed with a diversity of flower confirmation, ranging from the sublime to the grotesque, it is impossible to conceive what may be added through the hybridiser's manipulation. One thing is certain - there will always be something new - something even more exciting and fascinating than the lovely orchids you now cherish.

ADDITIONAL BY-LAW FOR WINTER SHOW.

16. All plants competing for prizes must have been owned by and in the physical possession of and cultivated by the exhibitor for at least SIX MONTHS prior to the opening of the Show.

PLANTS FOR SALE AT WINTER SHOW.

- all plants must be in good clean condition in sound pots
- all plants must be firmly established and no recent divisions will be accepted.
- -struck back bulbs must have established root growth and be potted in a container which will allow the bulbs to grow on
- members shall supply a list of plants for sale on the form issued by the Club and must be checked with a member of the plant stall nominated to receive plants and not just left.
- plants to be labelled with the name of the plant, flowering time, color members number and price required (subject to Club commission).
- plants will be received from 1 p m on Saturday 28th until 3.45 pm
- additional plants will be received during the Show provided that they are checked in the same manner as for those delivered on the Saturday.
- it is expected that each member willinclude in the number of plants a reasonavle quantity either in bloom or in spike (complete spikes)

REMOVAL OF PLANTS ON SATURDAY 4 AUGUST

All exhibitors are expected to assist in the removal of fencing and generally to assist in cleaning up. This will commence at 12.30 p m.

THE REMOVAL OF PLANTS BEFORE THE FENCING IS REMOVED IS PROHIBITED.
