Introduction

The Asia Pacific Orchid Conference comprises an international association between orchid enthusiasts of all countries included in the region, ranging from India and Sri Lanka in the west, to Hawaii and the Philippines in the east, Japan and Korea in the north to Australia and New Zealand in the south.

This is a young association which held its first orchid conference in Tokyo six years ago. The second conference was in Indonesia three years ago and now the third conference will take place in Adelaide, South Australia from 30th August to 4th September,

The Orchid Club of South Australia Inc. has an enviable record as a conference host and the 3rd Asia Pacific Orchid Conference should be no exception. The club have arranged an International Orchid Show on a spectacular scale, an enlightening lecture itinerary and a full and exciting social program.

The International Orchid Show

The Orchids will fill a large showroom of 1,500 square metres, which, in itself will be part of a giant flower exhibition featuring all types of prize blooms including roses, daffodils, sweet peas. camellias, azaleas, etc. plus large fern, bromeliad, bonzai and African violet exhibits. There will also be large garden exhibits by commercial nurseries, landscape gardeners and city councils. Overall the floral exhibits will fill two halls giving a total of 3,000 square metres plus 8,000 square metres of open area and pavilions. This will be the spectacular main feature attraction of the Royal Adelaide Show a giant 200 acre expo at Wayville Showground.

The A.P.O.C.3 Orchid Show will be superb. It will consist of individual exhibits of 9 square metre area and smaller bench top exhibits of approximately 2.5 square metres for cut flowers or small displays. Prize money is approaching Aus \$10,000.00 with the Grand Champion attracting a \$1,000.00 cash prize and the Reserve Champion \$750.00. The entire show schedule is included with our information leaflets, however, Champion classes include Australian Native Orchid, Cattleya and Allied Genera, Standard Cymbidium, Intermediate Cymbidium, Miniature Cymbidium, Dendrobium, Odontoglossum Alliance, Paphiopedilum, Phalaenopsis, Vandaceous, Miscellaneous (not elsewhere listed), Seedling of Any Genus plus Champion Display and Champion Display of 3 Cymbidiums for Colour.

There will also be awards for Best Overseas Exhibit Asia Pacific Group, Best Overseas Exhibit Non Asia Pacific Group, Australian Commercial Grower Small Exhibit, Australian Commercial Grower Large Exhibit, Australian Non Commercial Grower, O.C.S.A. Affiliated Society, Tabletop Exhibit.

The theme of the A.P.O.C. 3 Show will be "Asia and the Pacific Because the show, being part of an overall huge show, must have a professional appearance and some unity, back drops depicting the theme will be in place behind table and wall exhibits. It is important that all attending exhibitors have contact with the show organizer if any special back drops are planned. Materials such as pine bark and foliage plants will be available at the show site. It is intended that members of the show committee and others will "adopt an exhibitor". These personal contacts will be advised as soon as we have information upon the size and type of exhibit you are planning and the various needs that you have.

It is now urgent that you make your reservations for exhibition space as there are certain to be restrictions on space eventually.

It should be noted that any exhibits in the A.P.O.C. 3 Orchid Show will not be able to be removed until Sunday 10th September. This also includes commercial selling stalls.

MASDEVALLIAS

There are approximately 350 species in the genus Masdevallias, most of them coming from cool, moist mountain areas. Possibly because they generally need a cool damp environment, we here in Adelaide are loath to grow them, but they appear to grow well in and around the fernery.

Temperature

Temperatures should be cool to intermediate. Plants grow slowly and eventually die if temperatures remain too high for long periods of time. Cool evenings are ideal to reduce the hot day stress. Nights of 8-10 C are ideal, days where the temperature exceeds 26 C plenty of humidity and air movement helps to overcome the heat. When spraying down the plants it is advisable to do so in the mornings only, the rest of the day use plenty of water to dampen down the surrounding floor. Ideally try and maintain the humidity at 70-80%.

Fertilizer

should be applied on a regular basis whilst plants are actively growing. In a pine bark mix fortnightly applications of 30-10-10 are suggested, in other mediums 20-20-20 are used, as plants are spiking 'blossom booster' is recommended.

Water

As the plant has a minimum water storage the watering is very critical. The roots should be allowed to dry out but the plants should be watered immediately afterwards. If the compost has adequate drainage the plants will grow quite well if the compost is actually kept moist.

Light

Masdevallias like a low light situation, about the same level under which Phalaenopsis and ferns grow successfully.

Potting

Potting is done as the new roots appear, just before Summer, and every couple of years is ideal. Use a fine bark medium, overseas and Interstate many successful growers use Sphagnum, with the bottom 1/4 of the pot well crocked to give adequate drainage. After repotting don't be in a hurry to water, keep the humidity up and just mist the plants until the roots become well established.

The genus Masdevallias known for its unusual shaped but highly coloured flowers of many sizes. The unusual feature of the flower is that the sepals are the predominant part of the flower and often it takes a hard look to see the petals.

In Adelaide these plants are not readily available at many nurseries although there is one in our district that often has plants for sale, so if you see them for sale why not try a couple? If you succeed they are very rewarding.

CYMBIDIUM NOTES FOR FEBRUARY & MARCH

These two months are very important for successful flowering of *Cymbidiums*. The new growths must be kept moving, so they will bulb up to produce spikes. Give as much light and air movement as possible, beware of leaf burn. Plenty of low nitrogen fertilizer and water. Earl flowering varieties however should be well advanced with their spikes if not already flowering.

Care should now be taken when handling plants for the young spikes are very brittle and easily damaged.

Snails and Slugs are now preparing to attack your favourite so be prepared, clean up those old dead leaves and rubbish around your benches. use the new spray but be careful where there are spikes as some sprays cause malformations in the flowering.

Have your compost and pots ready to commence those repotting jobs that can be started in the Autumn.

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CATTLEYA NOTES

Plants which will be flowering in Autumn can have their fertilizer changed to a low nitrogen fertilizer now, otherwise regular fertilizing can be carried out with a complete well balanced fertilizer.

Make sure that adequate air movement is present with your Catts., this helps to prevent the need to spray with fungicide as fungus and mould thrive in still air, so an electric fan is a worthwhile investment for a Glasshouse.

In this hot weather make sure that adequate humidity is maintained by damping down under thew benches, misting the plants especially early morning and late in the afternoon. When watering try and keep the water out of the leaf axils, if this does occur up end the plant and drain out the water, if water is allowed to remain a bacterial rot is likely to occur hence the loss of buds (if a sheath is present) or even the loss of a new growth.

Any plants with growths growing over the edge and which are staring to send out new roots may be reported but watch out and do not damage the new roots. Plants that have the new roots growing can now be divided should you want to do so.

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MISCELLANEOUS GENERA

Special attention should be given to increase the humidity around the plants and have them where it is possible that there is plenty of air movement in an endeavour to keep them as cool as possible.

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Paphiopedilums

Keep the water up to your plants
Make sure that the shade over your plants has no bare patches
Keep up the humidity when the temperature is high
Keep insects out of the pots and off the leaves
Regular weekly fertilizing protects your plants from having any unnecessary set
backs in their growths.

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Australian Natives

Most of the denrob's are now making new canes, keep up the humidity around them and ensure that they have adequate air movement. Regular very weak applications of organic fertilizer can be beneficial to most natives. Sarc's are also making new growths and strong roots, watch out for slugs and snails.

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Stanhopea is a genus of medium sized to large epiphytic, lithophytic or terrestrial orchids with about 25 species widely distributed throughout tropical America.

The psuedobulbs are egg-shaped, 5-8 cms high and bear a single broad leaf, 30-60 cms in height. Flowers are large and showy and usually strongly scented, and not very long lasting. The flowers range in colour from pure white ,Stan. lowii var. Amesiana, through all shades of yellow, to a deep brown-purple, Stan. tigrina var. nigroviolacea. They are often very variable in colour within a single species.

Flower scapes usually bear 1-7 flowers which are often spotted or bloched with brown or purple.

The inflorescences grow downward or sideways, so wire baskets lined with coconut fibre or wooden slat baskets are recommended for culture. A free-draining bark compost is ideal and Stanhopeas grow very well hung in the Cymbidium shadehouse, the leaves, however burn very easily, so plants should be shaded whilst in active growth and during this period benefit by high humidity, plenty of water and light applications of fertilizer. After growth is complete they require a decided rest and then can tolerate full exposure to light. L. & R. Moore exhibited a fine specimen of Stan. wardii at the February Cultural Meeting and this plant was chosen as the Registrar's Flower of the Month.

The four inflorescences that were open each had 5-6 flowers and made an impressive display The large blooms were pale creamy-green delicately spotted purple-brown and were heavily perfumed.

Transporting an orchid in a large basket with so many blooms hanging underneath is no mean feat. Congratulations to Lewis and Rosalie, and thank you for making the effort so all our Club members could share this lovely orchid.

Heat 1 cup of water and add butter and baking soda.


Then add fruit and honey
