DONT SMOKE -- DONT TOUCH PLANTS -- DONT WANDER --

FOOD OR FERTILISERS:

To the uninitiated listening in on experts talking on fertilising they must think they are in the wrong meeting, after all. They set out from home to go to a horticultural meeting (vegetable) and a great deal of talk is heard about "horse manure", "fish meal", "whale oil" and "fowl products" (other than eggs) (animal) It is a little puzzling, so perhaps at this point we so-called experts should explain what and why we are talking about when we sound off with "N.P.K.".

On most fertilisers sold in packets you will notice a formula written on them usually in the form of 19-28-14 or N.P.K. In actual fact this means:- 30-10-10

N = Nitrogen

P + Phosphate

K = Potash

so taking the latter formula you would have -

N.30 which means 30 parts Nitrogen
P.10 " " 10 parts Phosphate
K.10 " " 10 parts Potash

from this start we can look at what each one of these symbols N.P.K. actually does to the plants when it is given at the right strength at the right time.

- (N) Nitrogen:- is a growth accelerator and to be used mainly in the growing period to help force large growths quickly.
- (P) Phosphate:- helps in the seed setting and flower production, it helps the bulb to reach maturity.
- (K) Potash:- For general good health and well-being of the plant; also enriches the colour of the flowers.

Fertilizer N.P.K. ratios should be varied at various growth cycles of the plants and also vary on different genera.

Vigorous or large growers usually need a fertiliser with a high nitrogen figure in their growing cycle but when it is getting near the time of flower bud initiation a fertiliser with a low nitrogen rating is recommended. With slow growers a more balanced fertiliser is used all year round.

Using animal manures is a little on the hit and miss side — how often do we hear that fowl manure should be watered down to a weak tea stage, (but how weak is weak tea?) This depends on the individual's own taste and the smell is somewhat over powering when it's been left for a week or so mouldering in a drum, but there is no doubt that animal manures make the plants grow, even if they do so just to try and get away from the smell.

Remember, even though we like to think we've improved our culture procedures over the years, that with fertilisers the old saying, "Alittle and often" still is as modern as the mini-skirt.

'SEEDLING':- A seedling shall mean a plant (being the whole clone undivided) not exhibited at a Show, meeting or award judging in a previous flowering season since being raised from seed. For exhibition purposes, seedlings shall retain their status of seedlings throughout the flowering season in which they are first exhibited at a show, meeting or award judging.

SPECIMEN CYMBIDIUM: - It is expected that the plant exhibited shall carry five flowering spikes.

EXHIBITORS RULES - WINTER SHOW - 1985

- 1. All exhibitors must be financial members of the South Coast Orchid Club of South Australia Incorporated
- 2. Entries are free.
- 3. Exhibitors are bound by the Constitution, Rules and By-Laws and Special Show Rules of the Club.
- 4. The opinion of the Judges is final and binding and no objections or discussions regarding results regarding results will be considered with the one exception of an infringement by an exhibitor of any of the Club's Laws, By-Laws or Show Rules. Any objection in this case must be lodged with the Club Show Secretary.
- 5. The Club accepts no responsibility for any loss, damage or infection suffered by any plant or blooms exhibited.
- 6. The Club reserves the right to photograph any of the exhibits if it should so wish.
- 7. In all matters regarding the arrangement and conducting of the Show (with the exception of judging) the Show/Marshall/Secretary is the ruling authority.
- 8. No plants suspected by the Club Virus Adjudicators of being infected with virus will be eligible for competition and such plants will be completely isolated from all other plants.
- 9. The exhibition areas will be closed during the judging. No exhibitors, public or members other than the Show Marshall/Secretary, Judges of the Club and Associate Judges and other persons appointed to assist in judging will be allowed to remain in the exhibition area during this period.
- 10. Non-exhibitors are requested not to congregate in the exhibition area prior to judging so that officials can arrange plants and perform other necessary duties unhindered.
- 11. Plants must be labelled with the colored labels provided by the Club with the exhibitors number and name of plant. Supply of these labels can be obtained from the Show Marshall/Secretary or his nominee.
- 12. Exhibitors are to ensure that all labelling be neatly and correctly performed in accordance with the procedure laid down on orchid Nomenclature and Registration. Labelling shall be legible from a reasonable distance.
- 13. All exhibits must be benched by 4 p m on Saturday 20 July 1985
- 14. Exhibits must not be removed before 12.30 p m on Saturday 27 July 1985
- 15. Exhibitors unable to remove their own plants from the Show should provide the person so doing with a letter of authorisation.
- 16. Damage caused in transit to the Show should be reported to the Show Marshall/Secretary or Registrar of Judges prior to judging.
- 17. If in the opinion of the judges, a plant exhibited is not worthy of an award or prize in any specified section, then none shall be given.

SEEDLING COMPETITION - MINIATURE CYMBIDIUMS.

MONTHLY COMPETITION

To assist the Club in raising finance for the 10TH Australian Orchid Conference your Committee has obtained from Adelaide Orchids seedlings which will be available at the May meeting. Two crosses have been chosen each one having as one of the parents the species cymbidium 'devonianum'. Until recent times this species has not been used very extensively for breeding, but Keith Andrews Orchids of the U K created world wide publicity when it was used to produce the 'Bulbarrow' crosses. The crosses are:— devonianum x Negrito 'Cherry Ripe' — expect glorious long arching red flowers spring flowering; and devonianum x Fairway Park expect rich brown tones with again arching spikes.
